
His Steps

Our Senior Chaplain Writes...



Dear friends

Spring is here! And although every season of the year has its own beauty, I have to say that spring is my favourite season. As the trees burst into leaf and the delicate

spring flowers push their way through the earth, brightening up the drabness of winter, I am reminded of God's faithfulness and of His promise of New Life and New Beginnings, and I feel alive and expectant.

"See I am making all things new." (Rev 21:5) says our God.

Easter of course is celebrated in spring and with that celebration comes the promise of New Life through Jesus Christ our Lord and Saviour. Alleluia!

As David and I move into retirement in June of this year, and as the Trustees seek to appoint chaplains to undertake the work the Lord has ordained for this Healing Centre, holding on to this promise of New Life and New Beginnings is essential for us all.

One Scripture that has been foremost in our thoughts for a number of years now is:

Building on what we did in the previous conference, we hope to provide a varied programme that addresses a number of the subjects suggested by those who attended last year.

Alongside this conference we continue to offer regular Healing Retreats, teaching days and themed weekends, all on aspects of the healing ministry, as well as providing the quiet space for meeting with our Healing Lord. This place

has always been a Healing Centre, so everything we offer is designed to enable Christ's healing ministry to continue.

Although our God tells us He is doing a 'New Thing' He also tells us this, as recorded by the prophet Malachi, "I the Lord do not change".

There will be New Beginnings but our God is - the Lord who heals and whatever the future holds for this Healing Centre, one thing we know for certain is that the Lord's healing work will continue.

It is my privilege to come to the Centre to serve as one of the visiting chaplains. I first experienced the healing work of Christ at the Centre when I came on retreat while I was in pastoral ministry. One thing leads to another, as is often the case in Christian service! I was invited



to lead a Quiet Day and then gradually to become a member of the team of visiting chaplains. At the moment I am at the Centre about once a month for a week or so.

I feel as though Crowhurst is in my blood. I began my school life at the primary school in Crowhurst village and remember an early school photograph being taken with me underneath the huge plane tree that stands in the school grounds. I lived at this time with my parents and sister, dogs, goat, ducks and snails in a cottage called 'Newstead', on Catsfield Road. This cottage still stands, though somewhat altered, particularly inside, I guess. My first contact with the Christian faith was through the Sunday School at St George's Church in the village. I enjoyed walking the mile downhill from the cottage, up the steep church path, past the ancient yew, to be welcomed by God's people. It was uphill going home!

Before training for Christian ministry I was in teaching for many years. I taught in London and at various schools in Essex. Music has always been important in my life. I often bring my clarinet with me to the Centre and enjoy contributing to the 'Music and Pictures' evenings organised by Maggie and Stephen on Thursdays. 
I rang the office to make the booking and was told there were only two places left; the rooms available were room 12 and 13!



Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest (Mark 6:31)

The Crowhurst Christian Healing Centre is a place where you can come for a few days or up to two weeks for rest, retreat, healing prayer and ministry.

The daily programme revolves around Christ-centred worship, Holy Communion and twice-weekly healing services - on Tuesdays at 7.30pm and Thursdays at 10.15am. Lunch is available after the service on Thursdays, but do phone the office to book first. These two healing services are also open to the public. Each day concludes with the service of Compline, at 8.00pm.



You can stay upstairs in the house, from which you can see lovely views onto the grounds, or in the wing, where the doors open out onto the patio and gardens.



There are also two rooms on the ground floor which are suitable for those with a disability and these too have patio doors which open out onto the beautiful grounds.



The Art Room is open every day except Sunday and Monday, and guided tuition is available for those who would like some guidance in exploring their creative side. We

also offer Prayer and Painting weeks throughout the year.

Weekend Healing Retreats are for those who are seeking more than just a peaceful place to stay. They include insights into Christian Healing, Christ-centred meditation, individual confidential prayer ministry, worship and a Healing Service. Read more on page 18.

We also hold Guided Quiet Days once a month, which cover a particular theme. These quiet days are an ideal opportunity to come to the Centre for a day and rest in the presence of the Lord, while being gently led in prayer, reflection and Scripture readings. Lunch is held in silence so that everyone can quietly reflect on the morning session and prepare for the afternoon. The day concludes at 3.45 with afternoon tea and the chance to share fellowship with one another. The cost of the day is £17.00, which includes morning coffee, lunch and afternoon tea.

Newcomers to the Centre usually return again. Once you have experienced just what the place offers, it is hard to stay away! Our feedback forms regularly have comments from guests who have been touched and healed by God in many ways. Here is just a small selection.

Coming to the Centre changed my life. The Lord removed much hurt, sadness and pain that I had been carrying with me for so many painful years

I found the peace I needed. I was able to relax and recover from the stress I had been under.

The healing of my spine started at the Centre along with some emotional family baggage wounds. I left feeling emotionally renewed. The healing continued and for the first time in my life I felt the full force of the Holy Spirit at the healing service in my own church – the result of which has meant NO OPERATION.

So why not give the Centre a try if you have never been before, or spread the word if you have!



This Retreat is always very popular and many folk come to it every year.

It begins on Thursday with the events of the Last Supper and re-enaction of the washing of the disciples' feet, which is always a very moving and humbling experience. We remember Our Lord's anguish in the Garden of Gethsemane, His loneliness as His friends one by one failed to keep watch with Him, and His betrayal by Judas.

On Good Friday, after breakfast, we enter into a day of silence. During the services we follow Our Lord's harrowing journey to His death on the Cross.

The Sunday morning sunrise service, usually around the water feature, sees the early risers gathering together to remember how the women discovered that the stone had been rolled away and Jesus' body had gone. We meet in silence as we reflect on this scene.

Following the Scripture reading we sing songs of

celebration and wish each other Easter greetings. After the service is over, we are treated to delicious, warm hot cross buns in the lounge, which keep us going until breakfast!

After breakfast, we join together in the large Chapel to celebrate the joyful Resurrection and share Holy Communion. The weekend concludes with the usual delicious Sunday roast!

This Retreat offers a time for reflection, relaxation, sharing, good teaching, praise and thanksgiving, and plenty of space to enjoy your own renewal.

One of the many comments from last year sums up this Retreat.

What a wonderful journey from sorrow to joy. The peace and love was overwhelming, as was the closeness to lesus.

A Bible Study Keep it in the Family - Matthew 20:20-28

Jesus is on His way to Jerusalem with His disciples. He takes them away from the crowd and speaks to them. He tells them bluntly that He is going to be betrayed and killed. Next He is approached by two of His disciples who want Him to do something for them.

This incident occurs both in Mark's gospel and in Matthew. But Matthew shows that the mother of James and John was present.

If you love doing logic problems then here is one. Matthew, Mark and John all name the women who stood at the foot of the cross when Jesus was crucified. Matthew tells us that the mother of Zebedee's sons (James and John) was present. In John's gospel we learn that the sister of the Virgin Mary was present – so we know that Mary had a sister and that she was supporting her during the agony of the crucifixion. And from Mark's account we can deduce that her name was Salome. So added together we know that Salome was the wife of Zebedee, the mother of James and John and the sister of Mary. If this is correct then this made her an aunt of Jesus. And in turn James and John were the cousins of Jesus.

So this throws a new slant on what happened. There is Salome – an astute business woman. She was concerned about the family fishing business. This had been hit by the departure of the two boys from it. She was now out to get the best deal she could. It was certainly a joint exercise and premeditated. The three of them presented themselves to Jesus - and the deal was this. James and John wanted the best places in heaven - one to sit on each side of Jesus in glory. Here was a touch of nepotism. After all they were family and why not keep the best places in heaven for the cousins! Clearly there was an expectation of personal reward and personal distinction.

Jesus challenged Salome, James and John. "You don't know what you are asking. Can you drink the cup I drink or be baptised with the baptism I am baptised with?" Remember Jesus had just told them what would be happening to Him in Jerusalem. He had only just told them that He would be betrayed, mocked, flogged and killed. Their reply was to say — "We can."

What they failed to understand was that Jesus referred to His crucifixion. There was one on His right and one on His left, but they were criminals. It was not the place of these brothers to share in His crucifixion.

James of course did later drink that cup of suffering. He was the first apostle to be martyred, and died by the sword at Herod Agrippa's direction. John, on the other hand was the only apostle to die naturally – in old age. His cup of suffering was the constant struggle of the Christian life over many years, and to see many of his contemporaries martyred.

But this is far from the end of the story. The other ten disciples felt indignant at this. These boys needed to be brought down. Jesus stepped in long before things could get out of hand. "You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their high officials exercise authority over them. Not so with you. Instead whoever wants to be great among you must be your servant."

Some years ago when I was a parish priest I had an attack of the POM's. (POM stands for Poor Old Me.) I was muttering and moaning about the lack of appreciation in the parish. I was working all hours that God gives and doing a tremendous amount of work behind the scenes, and basically nobody in the congregation was telling me that I was doing a good job.

THANKSGIVING DAY 2IST JULY 2012

At the end of my ranting to the Lord about it He said just one word – "So?" That word came so clearly into my mind. "So?" Then I suddenly realised that all my work was being appreciated by the One who saw all that was going on. It was Jesus that I was really serving and He was with me every inch of the way. It didn't matter that people in the parish were less than appreciative. In an instant the POM's vanished and I have never forgotten that experience.

Weekend Healing Retreats

Our weekend Healing Retreats provide an opportunity to come aside for personal reflection and renewal of body, mind or spirit. They are open to those of any church denomination, or of none, seeking Christian healing and wholeness.

The retreat begins on Friday at 3.45pm with tea and cakes, followed by welcomes and introductions, although you may arrive any time after 2.00pm. There is a time of quiet worship to settle you into your time away.

There is also time to explore the gardens and grounds or to go for a walk in the surrounding countryside. There is a fully equipped art room for you to enjoy and the lounge and library also provide comfortable places for your own relaxation.

After dinner the day concludes with Night Prayer and a reflection on anointing as we prepare for the healing service on Sunday morning. The weekend concludes after lunch on Sunday.

Numbers taking part are usually held to about fifteen to give plenty of opportunity for personal space and peace. We look forward to welcoming you to this God given place of healing and renewal.

I would like to say that it's a lovely place to work.




What gives me most job satisfaction is seeing the guests benefit from their stay at the centre.

Book Reviews

'The Scandal of Christianity' by R.T.Kendall Hodder & Stoughton, ISBN 978 0 340 96415 6

R T Kendall keeps drawing my attention, because his writing continues to have a dew-like freshness, and bears the handprints of God's Spirit over it.

It is true that he repeats himself with lines that are virtually identical with those in his other books, yet there is always a strength of conviction and relevance to the subject being considered.

In 'The Scandal of Christianity', RT once again proves that he is a man with an urgent message for our times. His basic premise is that we have a wonderful Saviour who has redeemed us by willingly enduring the shame of crucifixion. Our Christianity has become tame indeed if we are failing to see that the cross will always scandalise the world. By its logic, the powerful are not meant to be humiliated and shamed. As followers of Christ, are we prepared 'to suffer shame for His Name' and rejoice in doing so? (Acts 5:41) Of course it is a matter of depending entirely on God's grace in order to simply begin.

R T shares, with touching honesty, where he has grasped opportunities in his life to witness to the Lord; though often not without a struggle. He points out the consequences of failing to do so – an existence spiritually sterile and fruitless. This book is a call for wholehearted, valiant hearts who want to see God get all the glory for the death of His Son.

'When we accept the stigma that comes with the territory of obedience to God, we do not know how things will turn out. As we have seen, some escaped death "by faith", while others "by faith" went to their torturous death. As I said, we sign a blank cheque to God and let Him fill in the rest.' (Page 59)

Miracle Mine

On October 13th 2010, 33 Chilean miners were rescued from 2,300 feet under the earth, while millions of people around the world watched in amazement. In this book the leader of the group, Pastor Jose Henriquez, tells of the terrifying ordeal that he and his fellow miners went through, and of their miraculous rescue. But this is not just the story of the miners' rescue; it is also the story of how Jose came to find God many years before his gruelling underground ordeal, and of how God had prepared him to face the terrifying situation that he and his colleagues found themselves in.

Jose hadn't always been a Christian and his life was directionless until he discovered Jesus. He had been in danger many times before and believes that God had prepared him for what he was to face down the Chilean mine. His courage and strong faith brought many of the trapped miners to Christ.

This is a fascinating account of one man's unshakeable faith and trust in God during life's trials and in a situation which must have seemed like a certain death sentence. I read it over a couple of days (most unlike me!). It was very gripping and very inspirational! There are many colour photographs in the centre of the book, which brings the reader even more into this amazing story of human strength, courage, hope and divine intervention!
