Dear fellow followers of Jesus

The grass is greener ... Whoever always looks for greener grass on the other side will never be able to appreciate the green grass that was right under their feet the entire time. (Unknown)

Jesus has been found worthy of greater honour than Moses, just as the builder of a house has greater honour than the house itself. For every house is built by someone, but God is the builder of everything (Hebrews 3.3-4).

Hebrews is a classic work of art, written to a struggling people; some had even abandoned Jesus and the Church but the author was encouraging them to hang on to Jesus! The writer wisely and carefully builds his simple argument; Jesus is better.

Follow the argument chapter by chapter; Jesus is better than everybody and everything. Jesus is better than angels; Jesus is better than Moses; Jesus is better than Joshua, and then Aaron. Jesus is better than the Old Covenant, and better than the Old Testament sacrifices etc, etc. The whole point is to show that Jesus is the way and you need nothing else.

I have been fortunate enough to spend time at two different Christian Retreat Centres recently and it's hard not to make comparisons - it seems to be something people do. Was the restlessness for something more (better) built into us at creation or does it came about from our rebelling against God and making the shocking discovery that something (God) is missing?

As I praised the Lord for all we have here at the Crowhurst Christian Healing Centre (the staff, the grounds, the healing, hospitality and the peace), I was stirred by the truth that no matter how green our grass is (that we reflect something of the glory of God here), it does not compare with God himself.

Like you, I long for mountain top experiences, miracles and moves of God and I wonder if we would enjoy more of that sort of experience because we took up the challenge to live joyfully with Jesus, where we are now-rather than looking for it somewhere else?

Maundy Thursday

We were asked to imagine that we were bringing a companion to the weekend and each of us picked a stone to represent them. We then washed the stone, as if we were washing our companion's feet. On Easter Sunday we placed these stones around the Thanksgiving Cairn in the grounds. Veronica led the evening session and we shared with Jesus in His Gethsamene moments, trying to imagine what He went through in the garden as He asked His disciples to stay awake with Him. We felt His acute disappointment when they failed to do so and His agony as He asked for the cup to be taken away if it be the Father's will.

Good Friday

We spent some time thinking about a remorseful Judas, who regretted what he had done in betraying Jesus and how he tried to hand back the thirty pieces of silver to the chief priests and the elders.

We read how Jesus cried out from the Cross, and as He died, how the curtain was torn from top to bottom. And we recalled the powerful words of the Centurion, who said, "Surely this man was the Son of God!" (Matthew 27:54). We also reflected on the sorrow of the women as they watched Jesus die.

Easter Saturday

Yvonne led a session on worship using banners, which was a new experience for some people. We were free for the rest of the day, when some of us went for a walk and others spent time in the art room.

In the evening we had some lighthearted fun playing 'bingo with a difference.' Prizes were given out for the winners.

Easter Sunday

It was a beautiful morning as a number of folk gathered before sunrise around the large Cross (pictured below) along the Prayer Walk to remember that wonderful moment when Mary Magdalene discovered the empty tomb. The birdsong was loud and cheerful and a woodpecker could be heard drumming on a nearby tree. As you can see from the photo below, the rays of the rising sun shone through the Cross, creating a very special and memorable moment. Afterwards we gathered together in the lounge for drinks and hot cross buns, and later we had fun with an Easter egg hunt!




There is an open invitation for everyone to share a simple snack lunch and as with last year, we will have a marguee.

This was only our second Prayer Partners Weekend and we arrived in time for tea and cakes, with anticipation for what proved to be an awesome time spent in God's presence!

It brought home to us afresh what a privilege and responsibility it is to be part, in a small way, of the Ministry of Crowhurst by faithful prayer.

Having dedicated prayer partners wrestling against the spiritual forces of evil on behalf of the Healing Centre is wonderfully reassuring. During these weekends, our Prayer Partners seek God's heart for the Centre and also benefit from some time away from their busy lives to soak in God's presence.

In their article, Judith and David mentioned how 'Soaking' was the theme of the weekend. Steve G explains more below about soaking prayer:

"In the healing ministry the idea of soaking prayer is an extended period of prayer where time is given to allow God to be poured into the person needing prayer."

We need to give real time to God to allow Him to soak into our wounds, diseases and memories that need healing. As water saturates a dry sponge, changing its very nature and appearance until it naturally overflows, so soaking is about being soaked and doing soaking. To enjoy and experience God's loving heart one fills up (being) and the other allows the infilling to be poured out (doing).

To use the words of St Paul; "Let God fill you to the measure of all the fullness of Himself" (Ephesians 3.19). Or to use our modern day speak, "Be soaked in God's presence."



What is Christian Healing?

Healing can take many forms - physical, emotional, spiritual and relational. The words below have been included in past magazines, but this was over five years ago so I thought it worth including them again for those of you who may not have seen them before.

HEALING is seeing Christ in all things, and all things in Christ.

HEALING is thanking God for what He has already given you.

HEALING is a process of accepting God's truth and rejecting Satan's lies.


This list is not exhaustive and I am sure that many of you can think of other suggestions of what Christian healing means to you, so do write in and share your thoughts!

Bishop Graham writes: "Just as Jesus entrusted His followers with sharing the Gospel and healing the sick, so it is good today for all Christians to find confidence to offer prayer for healing. Expect careful prayer ministry in a small group and a chance to learn simple skills offering physical and inner healing to others."

Bishop Graham (retired) was the vicar of Holy Trinity, Coventry for eleven years before becoming Area Bishop of Willesden for eight years, and finally Diocesan Bishop of Carlisle for a further eight years. He was



also Chaplain at St. John's College, Oxford, and lecturer in Christian Doctrine at St. John's College, Nottingham. He retired in April 2009.

Bishop Graham's interests include Christian faith and daily work, Christian healing ministry, Holy Spirit renewal and the development of lay ministry (he has written a number of publications on these areas). He is married to Molly and they have four children and seven grandchildren. His hobbies include railways, model railways, travel, music and political biographies.

After the pancakes ... A journey through the wilderness

I visited the CCHC in February and took part in the Quiet Day on Ash Wednesday, led by Revd Colin Crook entitled, "After the pancakes ... a journey through the wilderness." We were encouraged to think about the Lent season ahead of us, and particularly to think about Lent as a wilderness experience. There were three short sessions led by Revd Colin, and after each one, we could find a quiet place to think, explore and pray.

"God have mercy on me a sinner" was one of the Lenten themes and as I reflected on this, I felt the Holy Spirit leading me into the wilderness to experience God's peace, to encourage and strengthen me. In the wilderness, the angels ministered to Jesus, and I felt the angels ministering to me too.

The wilderness can be a frightening and lonely place, but God always strengthens and restores us. 'Weeping might last for a night but joy comes in the morning', to quote Psalm 30.

We ended our Quiet Day with Holy Communion and there was an opportunity to experience 'Ashing' where, with an ash cross on our foreheads, we 'remember we are but dust and to dust we shall return'; an opportunity for us to stop and consider our journeys through life so far, and to pray for the future.

I came away with lots of thoughts and resolutions as to what I was going to do with my Lent, and with much material to help me.

I found the Quiet Day really helpful and very much enjoyed the peace and quiet that the chapels, buildings and beautiful grounds provide.

"It was in Maidenhead Baptist Church in the early 1950's that I first heard this hymn, which later became one of my favourites. I was representing the family at a service after my grandfather's funeral and we were singing 'In Heavenly love abiding, no change my heart shall fear.' I was struck by the enthusiasm and confidence with which the person beside me was singing it; how I wished that I could really believe it! At the time I was 'sitting on the fence'. But what joy there was when in 1959 I gave my life to lesus and was able to sing it with similar enthusiasm and confidence!

Since then this hymn, especially the first verse, has been such a blessing to me. One day a message was brought to me in the middle of a class lesson to say I was to go home as my father was ill. To calm down before my three hour journey, I sat in the car in the school drive and slowly recited this hymn.

My father survived but two years later I received a call to say that he had died sooner than expected. I was a three hour journey away from home but once again I kept repeating this hymn all through the journey and God kept me safe and at peace. God knew the situation and He WAS beside me (verse 2).

Verse one was particularly helpful when in 1987 I faced many changes at the same time: early retirement because of depression, the loss of my father, decisions to make about where I was going to live, choosing and furnishing a suitable property, and getting involved in a new church. But I knew I was

raged within me or around me, He was there with me and I needn't be discouraged.

Verse two again reassures me that God is with me. He guides me and He never sleeps. Then verse three gives hope for the future. 'Green pastures and bright skies.'

I find such comfort, reassurance and peace through all three verses. I will walk with Him", (v2) and He will walk with me." (v3) *********

Thank you Ruth for sharing why this lovely hymn means so much to you. I did some research on its background and as with many hymns, it was written out of the writer's own personal struggles with life.

Anna Waring, a Welsh poet and hymn-writer. was 27 when she wrote the hymn. Her family were Quakers, but she later became an Anglican and was baptised into the Church of England in 1842.

An apparently shy lady, with a placid personality, literary interests were fostered by members of her family. She had two works published, which contained dozens of her hymns, with 'In Heavenly Love Abiding' being the most well known.


Apart from her writing, Anna was also involved in prison ministry. Her hymn texts, and particularly 'In Heavenly Love Abiding', clearly reveal someone who was struggling with various challenges, but still she was able to reach out to those less fortunate through the Discharged Prisoners' Aid Society.

Anna never married and the words in her hymns show someone who was at times lonely, but she drew strength from her writing and was enabled to look beyond herself and her own problems.

This hymn has been a source of inspiration and encouragement to Ruth and probably to many other people who have sung it over the years. I have printed it in full on page 19.

In Heavenly Love Abiding: Anna Laetitia Waring 1820 – 1910 to the tune Penlan – 7676D

- In heavenly love abiding, no change my heart shall fear. And safe in such confiding, for nothing changes here. The storm may roar without me, my heart may low be laid. But God is round about me, and can I be dismayed
- Wherever He may guide me, no want shall turn me back. My Shepherd is beside me, and nothing can I lack. His wisdom ever waking, His sight is never dim. He knows the way He's taking, and I will walk with Him.



3. Green pastures are before me, which yet I have not seen. Bright skies will soon be over me, where darkest clouds have been. My hope I cannot measure, my path to life is free. My Saviour has my treasure, and He will walk with me.

Let everything that has breath, Praise the Lord!

Praising God in song can really lift your spirits. The book of Psalms is THE praise book of the Bible and gives us many reasons why we should praise God. King Saul often summoned the young David to sing and play the harp to him when he was feeling melancholy, and this helped to lift him out of his depression.

Here are just a few of the many psalms of praise:

Psalm 92:1 "It is good to praise the LORD and make music to your name, O Most High."

Psalm 100:1-2 exhorts us to "Shout for joy to the Lord, all the earth. Worship the Lord with gladness; come before Him with joyful songs." And verses 4-5: "Enter His gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise; give thanks to Him and praise His name."

Psalm 148 is one big psalm of praise! Here are the first four verses:

Praise the Lord.

Praise the Lord from the heavens; praise Him in the heights above. Praise Him, all His angels; praise Him, all His heavenly hosts. Praise Him, sun and moon; praise Him, all you shining stars. Praise Him, you highest heavens and you waters above the skies. And last but definitely not least! I'm sure most people know that wonderful song based on Psalm 150.

"Praise Him on the trumpet and the harp, Praise Him on the timbrel and the dance, Praise Him with stringed instruments too. Praise Him on the loud cymbals, praise



Him on the loud cymbals, let everything that has breath, praise the Lord!"


