

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# Editorial



Although this magazine is a quarterly one, for those who are reading it in January or February, Christmas will be a fading memory, while for those reading in early December, it will be very much on

your mind! As I pondered to write my 25th editorial (I can hardly believe it!), I wondered what to say. While thinking about Christmas, and what it means to me, I felt prompted by the Lord to share my thoughts with you all, so here goes!

So what does Christmas mean to you? Stress, expense, busyness, family, loneliness, joy, wonder? The Christmas period will mean different things to different people, depending on their circumstances. It can be a difficult time, especially in our current financial climate and we can too easily lose sight of what the season is really about - the birth of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

Children are always excited and enthralled by Christmas. They love the twinkling lights and decorations, and the tree surrounded by presents, which they are always so desperate to unwrap before the big day!

#### Our Senior Chaplain Writes ...



Dear Friends,

As I was preparing for a recent Healing Retreat Weekend, I asked our Lord what should be the focus of the worship. Not

surprisingly, I believe our Lord said, "Focus the worship on me." He then prompted me to look at the first few verses of Psalm 147. WOW! How great is our Lord!

- Praise the LORD! How good to sing praises to our God! How delightful and how fitting!
- <sup>2</sup> The LORD is rebuilding Jerusalem and bringing the exiles back to Israel.
- <sup>3</sup> He heals the broken hearted and bandages their wounds.
- <sup>4</sup> He counts the stars and calls them all by name.
- <sup>5</sup> How great is our Lord! His power is absolute! His understanding is beyond comprehension!

Please notice what the Lord is doing in these verses; He rebuilds cities and nations, heals and bandages wounded people and He counts stars which He knows by name. How great is our God; nations, people and galaxies are all on His agenda.

My 'Pilgrims Guide to the Holy Land' reminds me that Jerusalem is one of the most ancient cities and during its long and turbulent history, the City has been besieged on more than 50 occasions, conquered 36 times, and has suffered no less than 10 total destructions. Where is God through this? I think of Zimbabwe, Syria, and not least of all England. Where is God in these countries and their histories? God is at work, rebuilding the cities and nations - to see His Kingdom come.

From a young boy in Zimbabwe to the present, my journey through life has seen people destroyed by addiction, succumb to cruel merciless diseases, ruthlessly bound by the evil one and robbed of their identity. Where is God in these people's lives? I think of the children, the poor, the elderly, and the innocent. Where is God? God is at work, healing the broken hearted and bandaging their wounds.

I believe God is at work every day to rebuild nations, to save and heal people, to bring His Kingdom to earth as it is in heaven. He calls us all (you and me) to help in this work. (I leave the counting and naming of stars to Him!).

How can I be so sure about God's rebuilding and healing work? Over the next few weeks we will remember that God came into the world, born of the Blessed Mary, seen by the excited shepherds and worshipped by the Wise Men. God came into the world in Jesus, to build, to heal, and to announce the Kingdom of God is among you. That is how I am so sure – Jesus is all the proof I need.

When I spend time thinking about what our Lord is not doing, it leads me to doubt and despair and decreases my faith. When I spend time thinking about what our Lord has done, is doing and can do, I find my faith is built up and I'm more useful to our Lord.

Please receive my thanks for all you do to help us in the work here, especially for your prayers and be assured of our prayers for you and your work there. May the kingdom of God be real in our lives today.

There was snow on the ground and it was a dark, late afternoon in January this year when my husband, Ted, had the devastating news that he had cancer of the oesophagus. We went home in silence holding hands but I do remember saying, "We trust in God. We will get through this together." That night I could not sleep and I spent some of the night in prayer. The Lord said to me. "Go and pray over Ted." I knew what I had to do. I placed my hands on the area of the oesophagus and the Holy Spirit gave me the words.

A couple of weeks later Ted had a CT Scan and a little bit of me thought why did God not remove the tumour? After all I did pray over him. But of course I then realised that healing does not always come immediately. We thanked God that the cancer was contained and had not spread.

As the weeks followed, Ted had to endure nine weeks of gruelling chemotherapy, but during that time we were encircled in prayers in our parish and in the bidding prayers every week at Mass. With so many people praying for us, how could God not listen and answer prayers? Ted was prayed over at our quarterly healing and wholeness services, and anointed in oil.

After the chemo we had five lovely weeks for Ted to get strong before major surgery. We went to the Crowhurst Christian Healing Centre where Ted had ministry and was prayed over at the healing services. We never once doubted our loving God would not heal Ted. Our faith and trust in God was steadfast.

On June 24<sup>th</sup>. Ted had major surgery to remove the tumour. The surgeon said the tumour was smaller then he first thought. It was removed and Ted was now cancer free. "Praise God!" Recovery is slow but Ted has been **HEALED** and our faith is even stronger. God has done that for Ted and me, and also our children who went through so much. God can do that for you too.

### "What do you do?"



#### "What do you do? Where do you come from?"

Other people love to know our identity, probably so that they know which box to put us in. It's also a fundamental need for ourselves to belong, be known and be accepted.

In Ireland, anybody who was born even a few miles away was known as a 'blow in'. I was told by a lady who had married into the community that nobody would listen to her opinion as she was a 'blow in'.

Many of us struggle to be accepted and acceptable. Ministers will work their socks off to impress congregations; children of 50 years old will live their lives under the condition, 'if you are good'; others

will struggle with winning the approval of their peers. Jesus didn't!

For us, life is often a struggle to find acceptance. Does the diagram below ring bells for you?



It's all such hard work. We have to keep achieving in order to maintain our status. We have to find things or people to nourish us. Working to be accepted is on-going hard work. **It's not what Jesus did.** 

Several decades ago Frank Lake, a Christian Psychologist, explored how Jesus lived and ministered, and discovered that Jesus lived in an alternative way. He put the cycle above into reverse, like the diagram on page 7.



### "Where do you come from?"



The starting point is **Acceptance**, and the key example is the Baptism of Jesus. Father speaks, "You are my Son, whom I love, with you I am well pleased." Jesus' sense of belonging, identity and acceptance are encompassed in this moment. Father said these words before Jesus had done anything! Father says the same to us, before we have done or achieved anything. That is awesome and on that rock we can build.

We don't just need this sure foundation but need continued nourishment – we need to be sustained. Carol Dreeling, one of our prayer ministers, commented that many young people are sustained and nourished through the uncertain world of virtual relationships on social media. I wonder where we go for **Sustenance?** What do we depend on? For Jesus it was a total dependence on Father. Jesus spends a night in prayer, seeking out Father's heart for Apostles. Father provides! "All I have needed thy hand hath provided."

We live in a culture that craves for **Status**. or significance through power, authority, position, celebrity etc, but these are phantoms that slip through our fingers like smoke. As we look at Jesus we find that He was totally sure of the reality of who He was. "I am from above." "I am the bread of Life." "I am the good shepherd." All these spring from knowing Father's view of Himself. We often live under a cloud of false and damaging descriptions of who we are that come from family, the past, work and any number of places. Transformation comes when we start hearing what God calls us. "You're not Simon, you are Peter, the Rock man." I think it was probably unbelievable to Simon or his friends at the time. Maybe we need Christian friends to be part of the source of re-education for us, as to our true identity.

For Jesus, it is from the foundations being **Accepted, Sustained** and **Status** that He lives and ministers, only ever doing what He sees Father doing.

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# "Reconciling the World to Himself" A day of Prayer, Reflection and Healing

This was the title chosen by Bishop Martin of Chichester for his keynote speech at a day of healing for all denominations, which was held in September at the Charis Centre, Crawley.

On a lovely autumn day, about 150 people from all over Sussex gathered at this former school, which is now the home of Crawley Community Church. Together they shared a day of prayer, reflection and healing, and spent time thinking individually and collectively on the theme of the day - "Reconciliation With God, Myself and Others", having been given on arrival a beautiful prayer card depicting the icon, "Christ is our Reconciliation", and a prayer by Brother Roger of Taize:

"O risen Christ, You breathe your Holy Spirit on us and you tell us: "Peace be Yours - opening ourselves to your peace - letting it penetrate the harsh and rocky ground of our hearts - means preparing ourselves to be bearers of reconciliation wherever you may place us.

But you know at times we are at a loss. So come and lead us to wait in silence, to let a ray of hope shine forth in our world."

Everyone was also given a card to use for personal reflection with the questions, "What have I brought to this day? Why did I come? Where do I need reconciliation? Where can I be a reconciler? What will I take from this day?"

After a time of gentle Taize worship, led by members of St. Margaret's Church Rottingdean, Bishop Martin began by telling

us of his experience of the healing ministry during nine years working at the Pilgrimage Centre at Walsingham. He was often asked by journalists, "Do you have healings? Do you have miracles?", as though they could be purchased off the shelf and handed out, which is how the secular world perceives the Christian experience of healing and reconciliation - neatly packaged with a price on it. He quoted 2 Cor. 5:19, "God in Christ reconciling the world to Himself," and said that the vocation of the church – the company of the baptised - is to be the gathering of the whole human race, by nature togetherness, which is the complete opposite of the present culture of single unit dwellings, isolation and individualism.

The church is called to be open-doored congregations with space for the stranger and those who are different. We are called to be people seeking to open the windows into the reconciliation of God in Christ Jesus. The Bishop spoke about how those open doors in the past had disgracefully and tragically not offered freedom and liberation, but had been compromised by abuse. And how we are called as Christians to sit at the feet of those who have a narrative to tell, having nothing to say that can make it better, but to spend time to listen and allow God to heal, reminding us again of Paul's words about God in Christ reconciling. There was time for a question and answer session, and we felt Bishop Martin had given us so much to reflect on.

After a delicious lunch prepared by the Centre Staff there was time to visit the 'Market Place', a variety of stalls in other rooms which offered different aspects of



reconciliation and healing. The CCHC's stall had a video presentation and display of Maggie's wonderful art.



At other stalls, there was an opportunity to have conversations about Healing on the Streets and Healing Rooms, Christian Aid, Centering Prayer or Forgiveness. The Mothers' Union had a display of their work with families and a detention centre, and the teddies they knit for comfort. Cursillo (a Christian outreach movement) had a very colourful stall, and the Shawl Ministry display attracted a great deal of interest.

There was also a popular bookstall and a quiet room, where there was a beautiful display of icons. During the afternoon, a couple of sessions led by Father John Wright on praying with icons were packed out, with standing room only!

Dawn Allan, the Chaplain at The Martlets Hospice, Brighton, brought her card game 'Conversations for Life', a tool for helping people come to terms with approaching death, and Peter Wells the Lead Chaplain for Brighton and Sussex Hospitals Trust, had

conversations on reconciling our personal relationships.

Minsters of Healing had a busy time praying with those who requested it, and the day concluded with a peaceful service of Evening Prayer in the Iona tradition, led by Revd Gail Souppouris and Revd Helen Rose.

Almost two years of planning, and much prayer support from Crowhurst, made this a day to remember and one which introduced many more folk to the wonderful place which is Crowhurst.



A little, almost detached, wooden cabin, just to the right of the Centre's large Chapel, has been in existence on that site at least since the thirties. Its name is Poustinia - a word full of resonance, conjuring up something exotic and mysterious. The name in fact is Russian, and means solitude or desert. I had the privilege of living in this unique abode, whilst serving the Lord as a 'Resi' from between 1995 and 1998. It was really good being there and this was so notwithstanding the lack of a bathroom, and some testingly cold conditions in winter! At that point in my life, Poustinia was exactly what I needed for drawing closer to Jesus. For it was a big antidote to stress and tiredness - after long days of service in the main house - to be able to retreat back there: and then learn to trust the Lord for recharging in His presence.

It has to be said that being still and knowing that God is God is not an easy process (no wonder it's a command - Psalm 46:10). Like prayer itself which it is part of, it requires serious determination - and yes, love and desire. It is always sheer grace to know these exquisite moments when the Lord's love feels so close and real. That for me was the heart of the Poustinia experience.

All this was framed by the visible, daily aspects of life in a simple and homely cabin. There was in fact a toilet and a washbasin, so the basics of physical dignity could after all be maintained! And as regards the cold, I finally did something about it, in that I followed some advice to put a blanket under my bed's bottom sheet, and I also accepted the loan of a friend's electric heater. The kind friend was to become my wife!

There is something about living a semi-solitary existence and at the same time being close to creation - feeling the full impact of the four seasons, along with their endlessly changing patterns. How can one not fail to see the glory of a most wise and caring God, in having such exposure! I remember my heart thrilling to the sight of the spring flowers near the cabin; and to the pink and yellow roses in the summer,

along with an exquisite purple and white stripey clematis (picured right) growing up one of the hut's outside corner



posts (part of the verandah area).

The three years I spent in Poustinia changed my life. I thank the Lord so much for what He taught and showed me there. A 'poustinia perspective' is now a permanent part of my outlook. Let me encourage you to search for places (these could include a quiet church, a favourite room, your garden shed, a wood, a beach, or downland) that are conducive to stillness beyond the norm; or to more deeply engage with them. For although we don't ultimately depend on such settings, in them we find God more easily, and are blessed beyond our imaginings.

The building will be similar in style to the old one, with wooden clad walls and roof. However it will have much better insulation, be accessible to all, have a WC, a large prep area and probably most striking of all, floor to ceiling windows and doors across the back of the building, overlooking the magnificent view over the fields.

The total cost is to be £100,000 to cover all the groundworks, connecting water, electricity and landscaping as well as the building. Thank you Lord that we are well on the way; we look to you Lord, in faith, for all that is needed.
