Storms! None of us can escape the storms of life and we all at some stage pass through turbulent waters. Storms can arrive without warning - life is unpredictable at times - just like the weather!

A song in which I find great comfort during life's storms is 'Praise you in this Storm' by a brilliant band called Casting Crowns, the words of which are really uplifting and encouraging. This band have written many powerful songs and the story behind this particular song is amazing; perhaps I will share it in the next magazine.

Chorus:

I'll praise You in this storm, and I will lift my hands, for You are who you are, no matter where I am. And every tear I cry, You hold in Your hands; You never left my side, and though my heart is torn, I will praise You in this storm.

That says it all! No matter what we go through in life, God is who He is - the great 'I AM' (Exodus 3:14) and no matter where we are, and whatever we go through, He cares. He holds our tears in His hands and He will NEVER leave our side (Deuteronomy 31:6; Hebrews 13:5). What more can we ask for?

When we're in the middle of a personal storm, all we can think about is getting out of it, and longing for our troubled waters to be stilled. The Lord can seem far away

during difficult times, and His presence can seem hard to find, though in reality He hasn't moved - He never does, and He never changes; Jesus is the same yesterday, today and forever! (Hebrews 13:8) He is Sovereign and Lord of all, in the good as well as the bad times. We have to hold onto these Biblical facts and be encouraged by God's Word and not our human feelings during rocky patches.

The Psalmist doesn't say that God will help you

IF you get into a strong refuge – it says that GOD IS THAT REFUGE. (Psalm 46:1) In Him we live and move and have our being. (Acts 17:28)

As a result we can be sure, as Paul reminds us, that nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus. Psalm 46 lists a number of alarming events that would strike fear into all our hearts and minds: the earth giving way, mountains falling into the sea, nations in uproar, kingdoms falling - and the truth is that today we are witnessing these events and others - persecution for example - just as the Lord said it would be. However David is as steadfast as ever: he knows that God is his refuge and strength and is with him ... "Be still, and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth." (verse 10).

It reminds me of the great Old Testament deliverance story when Moses and the Israelites, who are being pursued by the Egyptian Army, stand before the Red Sea. Moses says the most unusual thing:

"Do not be afraid. Stand firm and you will see the deliverance the Lord will bring you today ... you need only be still." (Exodus 14:13-14) Over time, these great Old Testament characters learnt to trust God – it wasn't an automatic thing. They had multiple testing experiences to grow their trust, and that's the key; they learnt the lessons and matured in their walk with God - who did not let them down – even though at times it may have felt like He did.

So each day, while all around seems to be falling apart (or is), I can choose to believe that God is my refuge, to be still in His presence, to wait and watch, and be reminded that nothing is impossible for God, who has, does and will triumph.

God alone stays the same – anchor-like, trustworthy, and faithfully kind to all.

I find that I am given ample opportunity in the classroom of my discipleship, with the Holy Spirit as my Teacher, to learn to TRUST IN HIM ALONE. It's not easy but I value the lessons. I wonder what your classroom currently looks like; what are the lessons that the Holy Spirit is teaching you? (Ask Him to show you if you are not clear.)

Whilst there may be plenty to unsettle and disturb us, try and find time every day to be reminded of all the Lord has done, and continues to do, to bring his Kingdom to earth as it is in heaven. There is evidence all around - may our faithful Lord thrill you with His goodness as we journey toward that day when all will be well and we will confidently know this for ourselves – thank you Lord.

Do make a note in your diaries for our annual day of thanksgiving. Tea and coffee will be available from 10am and the morning service will begin at 11am. As with the last two years, the CCHC will provide a simple snack lunch, which can be enjoyed in the lovely grounds. Steve Clark will be our preacher and in the afternoon he and Hilary will be released from their ministry at the Centre, after which there will be an opportunity to say goodbye to them both over tea and cakes.



A warm welcome awaits all those who come through the doors of the Crowhurst Christian Healing Centre. Situated in an area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, it is just four miles from the coast in the Sussex High Weald. The peace and comfort of this place creates an ideal setting in which to draw closer to God and experience His love.

Guests can come to stay for a few days or up to two weeks for rest, retreat, healing prayer and ministry and to experience the healing touch of Christ in this place of His peace and hospitality.

The daily programme revolves around Christ-centred worship and Holy Communion; each day concludes with the service of Night Prayer at 8.00pm. There are also twice-weekly healing services - Tuesdays at 7.30pm and Thursdays at 10.15am, which includes Holy Communion. Both services offer the opportunity to receive the laying on of hands and are also open to the public.

Prayer ministry is available to our guests and also to those outside the Centre. Two Prayer Ministers come alongside a guest seeking to pray like Jesus, 'according to the Father's will.' It's about trying to co-operate with God who delights to set people free, whether the dis-ease is physical, emotional, relational or spiritual. To book an appointment telephone

01424 830033, or if you live close by, we have a drop in facility available every Wednesday from 2.15 to 3.45pm, to receive prayer ministry in our Prayer Rooms.



Every year we hold our annual day of Thanksgiving; this is always such a happy day of worship and fellowship when friends old and new come together to give thanks to the Lord for all His provision at the Centre.

Our accommodation has at times been described as 'five star', including the delicious and plentiful food. You will never go hungry at Crowhurst! (Special dietary requirements can be accommodated by prior arrangement.)

Good food reminds us of the generosity of God and we see such things as important. We take pride in using locally sourced food. Meals are freshly prepared on site and include a varied choice. One guest writes:

"Meal times at Crowhurst are really something to look forward to. The comfort of the accommodation, the service and welcome are up there with anywhere I have stayed." Tan

The ground floor consists of a library, dining room, lounge and two chapels. All accommodation is full board, with the majority en-suite, and two of our bedrooms are specially adapted for those with limited mobility, including their en-suite and shower. (Guests do need to be self-caring or bring a carer with them.) There is also a recently constructed wet room in the wing corridor.

For the creative among you (or if you would just like to 'dabble') there is a large, fully equipped art room with lovely views over the grounds.

Easter Celebration April 2017 - Freedom is coming!

Easter at the CCHC was a very special time as we considered God's work of salvation through the four cups of the Passover. Each cup of the Passover remembers one of the four promises of Exodus 6, given to Moses for the Israelites in slavery, which were:

- I will bring you out
- I will free you
- I will redeem you
- I will take you as my people and I will be your God.

So the theme of the weekend was very much centred around freedom and laying down the things which hold and bind us.

The Thanksgiving Cairn on the lawn at the CCHC is a perfect place to lay or decorate stones to reflect our thanksgivings – but isn't quite the place to leave things we have asked God to be freed from, or where we can let go of what God is asking us to relinquish. So the idea of creating a Freedom Cairn grew, which developed into a Freedom Garden.

The Freedom Garden, which is situated on the grass in front of the wing, is a small circular garden with a cross shape cut through it. (See photo below). The gardening team have done a great job in developing the garden so that it is accessible to all – thank you.



In the heart of the garden, at the centre of the cross, is a small cairn of stones – some which have been written on and some not. These represent our 'releasings' to God. On the edge of the garden, next to the pathway, is a chimenea, which is the place for burning letters and papers.

The garden has become full of symbolism, the circle reminding us of the world and God's eternal love.

The garden reminds us of God's creation, with both flowers and weeds. The pathway, in the shape of a cross, reminds us of the work of salvation. Jesus suffered and bore our sins and our dis-ease, and bought our freedom. So we can leave stones, rocks and broken pottery, laying them down on the cairn to represent what we want to leave behind – or what we want to release to God; then we walk away and leave God to do it.

Marilyn spoke about the powerful symbolism during what was a most special and awesome weekend, so freeing, with many 'Kingdom moments', and she came away with much to reflect on. She was particularly moved when the group reflected on the Israelites hurrying through the parted Red Sea as they fled from the Egyptian Army, which they symbolically re-enacted by walking through the narrow kitchen corridor to collect their picnic lunch. As they squeezed together through the corridor, they tried to imagine in some small way what the Israelites would have been experiencing in such a scary situation!

And from Shirley:

The Easter weekend gave me so much to ponder and reflect on. There was a wonderful sense of peace and love throughout the weekend. It was very special. I found the hand washing on Holy Thursday particularly moving.

What stood out for me on the Saturday were the Stations for Reflection which had been so beautifully set up around the house. These were based on the story of God's Relationship with humanity following the Fall; a journey through the great love story that brought us a promised land for all life eternal in the Kingdom of Heaven.

On Easter Sunday morning, some of us attended the early morning sunrise. Banners were waved and people danced round the fountain, singing 'Jesus put this song into our hearts'.

And from two other guests:

- I received one of God's most wonderful promises - "I am the Lord who heals you body, soul and spirit!"
- Another wonderful time with you all here's to the next time! It was such a joy. I will come again, to meet more Christian friends, to praise the Lord and to thank Him for all we receive here.

Grandparenting Ministry Day "I am the Mender of Broken Pots."

Grandparents have no rights of access to their grandchildren. Some find themselves loving their grandchildren, but without the opportunity to form a warm loving relationship, or are even denied access. This day was for them.

The vision for this day came out of our own experience, and from the experiences of numbers of people both at the Crowhurst Christian Healing Centre, and in our local churches.

The first years of grandparenting were for us painful and wounding. In the kitchen one morning, after a particularly difficult time, I was making a cup of tea and was grieving. A ceramic pot rolled off the windowsill onto the worktop and broke into three pieces. I went over and picked up the pieces that seemed to symbolise my own brokenness. As I held them I heard the Lord say so clearly, "I am the mender of broken pots" and I knew He didn't mean just sticking them together again. The Lord has been true to His word, and has wonderfully restored the relationships within our family.

That day in the kitchen was the start of a long journey for us, so we fashioned our Grandparents Day as a journey, sharing some of the lessons we learned along the way.

At the start of our journey, we focused on the one who is 'The Mender of broken pots'.' Kintsukuroi, means 'to repair with gold'; the art of repairing pottery with gold or silver and understanding that the piece is more beautiful for having been broken.

Our Father God delights to take the broken things in our lives and make something of value, worth and beauty out of them.

Heartache over our grandchildren is akin to a bereavement so the format used by a local bereavement charity for children seemed appropriate for the last session of the morning, 'Small Steps to Freedom - Holding on, Letting go, Moving on.'

Holding onto prayer; never giving up on praying for our loved ones. Holding onto God's precious promises for them. Holding onto our prodigals, our children who have wandered away.

Then, letting go. Letting go of resentment, forgiving those who have hurt us, forgiving ourselves, and perhaps forgiving God. Letting go of trying to fix it; relinquishing our precious children and grandchildren into the care of Father God, who loves them more than we do and trusting Him to fix it.

Then the tough bit: moving on with our lives. At the end of this afternoon we joined in a symbolic act of relinquishment, writing the names of our children and grandchildren onto pieces of broken terracotta pots and placing them at the foot of the cross. Turning and walking away from the communion rail was a powerful reminder that our Lord was broken so that we may be made whole.

Times of Word and Worship, sharing, reflection and prayer ministry added to what was a surprisingly enjoyable and positive day. A big thank you to everyone who attended and those who took part.

Farewell to Purple Land



On 21st March, David Fawcett, one of our Prayer Ministers, went to be with the Lord. Many of you will have met David and his wife Rachel, either through prayer ministry at the Centre, or when attending the 'Purple Day' that she and Steve G led in April 2015. Here, Rachel shares some thoughts of 'Purple Land', a place where it's fun to be old! She also shares how she journeyed with David through Purple Land and how she was with him on his final journey to the Perfect Land, heaven.

First of all I want to tell you about 'Purple Land'. It grew out of the famous poem by Jenny Joseph "When I am an old woman I shall wear Purple".

During the long nights with David in the hospice, there grew in my mind the concept of the Purple Land. It was the way I processed all that David and I were going through.

Purple Land is a magical place inhabited by retired people. No theme park you have ever visited is as wonderful as Purple Land! There are towering mountains, tranquil rivers and shimmering lakes. Opportunities for entertainment and life long learning are boundless. You could join a choir, learn to paint, take up gardening, become a volunteer, learn to shoot. There were swings and roundabouts for when the grandchildren come to visit. You could take them bowling or fishing, whatever your preference.

But perhaps best of all were the endless opportunities for travel - anything from a few days on a train to a year long cruise.

But that is only part of the story. In reality Purple Land is just one of the stations on our long journey through life. Purple Land is the junction where you wait for your train to your final destination. One day each one of us will receive our bespoke railway ticket from the 'High Controller'. It is only on that day we will know the date and the route of the final stage of the journey.

In 1999 David and I both arrived in Purple Land. We came alone. We came on different trains and arrived on different platforms. We had known each other for many years so when we saw each other across the railway lines we exchanged friendly waves.

We were both recently bereaved. Every now and again David would phone me from Scotland just to encourage me. Our friendship slowly developed and thirteen years ago on the 4th February we were married.

Living in Purple Land was a wonderful experience for both of us. Before David died I was able to thank him and to tell him that he had shared with me the happiest years of my life. It was the same for him.

We lived together in our little house on the edge of the Rye Harbour Nature Reserve. We worked in the garden and watched the rabbits chasing each other in the field opposite. We made many new friends. There was the U3A where David was part of the Spanish group. There was the motorcycle group. On Sundays we worshipped at St Richard's Church and made many friends through the Crowhurst Christian Healing Centre.

One of my great joys was to share with David my Thai Friends. 2011 was the year of the central Thailand flood. David and I became involved with flood relief. The Thai people loved him; they mostly called him Lung Dawid.

He was just the right height, not too tall and not too short. He was kind and gentle. He made his limited Thai go a long way and they in return practised their English on him. They loved his zest for Thai food and were delighted when he cooked steaks on a wok over a charcoal bucket.

We visited the ancient cave dwellings in Cappadocia and walked in the snow on the Picos Europa. Right up to the very end David was planning new trips. One of his last sentences was "I want to go on a railway journey to Snowdon."

Of all our many trips, it is the early morning train up the Jungfrau that made the most lasting impression on me. I shall never forget the beauty of the morning sun shining on the glacier. I felt I had looked into heaven and seen the beauty and holiness of God himself.

Now as I have come to David's last journey, it is this picture that stays with me. For David it was a steep, tough journey and I was able to travel with him to the very gate of heaven. As the sun came through the window on the 21st March, David slipped from time into eternity. I didn't see the golden gates open or hear the bells ring, but I believe David did. I believe he heard the son of the Great Controller say "Welcome David, Well done my good and faithful servant come and share my joy!"

As for me, I crossed the railway line and entered the dark lift on the other side. I pressed the button and descended to Purple Land. I was soon back in our little house. I shall still work in the garden and watch the rabbits play. Nothing has changed but all will be different.

(This was blessed and dedicated as The Freedom Garden during the Easter Celebration in April.)

Unfortunately, the Monkey Puzzle tree which was in the centre has had to be relocated to near the bungalow but it is expected to thrive there.

Now that the fire escape is finally finished, there are a number of new projects planned for the next few months. The louvre windows in the dining room are being updated, and there are plans to replace the back door of the kitchen and the windows at the front of the building, the library and Rooms 12 and 13. This will provide a continuity of design and help with keeping the warmth in.

The new outside toilet for use by visitors to the Prayer Rooms is well under way and should be operational by the end of May. The new wet room in the wing corridor is also in progress and should be completed around the same time.

A new metal container has arrived, which will really help with our storage problems, where items are needed to be keep dry and pest-free. It was initially put in the wrong place but has now been repositioned. As you can see from the photo below, Des and Dave decided to try it for size!
