If you have never visited CCHC before, you can be assured of a warm welcome from our Chaplains, Steve and Suzanne (pictured above).

We have a wonderful team, from housekeeping and catering team (pictured right), to the office staff (two of whom are pictured below) who will be on hand to book you in and answer any queries you may have during your visit.

Our Five Star Food Rating continues to be awarded by the Food Standards Agency and you certainly won't go hungry during your stay!

You can come to stay for a few days or up to two weeks for healing rest, retreat, space and prayer and can use the time to suit you. If you would like to be quiet during your stay, there is a silent table available at meal times.

The Centre's daily programme revolves around Christ centred worship, Holy Communion and twice-weekly healing services - Tuesdays at 7.30pm and Thursdays at 10am (with Holy Communion), both of which are open to the public and include the opportunity for brief individual prayer and the laying on of hands. Prayer underpins God's work at the CCHC and the team regularly pray together. Prayer is also offered to folk from outside by prior appointment arranged with the office, and drop in prayer (without the need to book) is available in our newly refurbished Prayer Rooms every Wednesday from 2.15 - 3.45pm.

God will meet you at your point of need as you rest in His presence. Earlier in the year, a pastor booked in for his own silent retreat, remaining in his room for the entire stay (no food, no services - just God). He wrote ... "I have had some lovely conversations with our Lord, some wonderful revelations and the things I came seeking guidance about for the future He has shown the way."

The Mantrap and the Key

One of our visitors felt led to share this powerful testimony of healing and release which she received at one of the Thursday morning Healing Services earlier in the year.

During a Thursday morning Healing Service in the large chapel I became aware that I was in a spiritual mantrap. I was completely caught and held in a vice-like grip which I understood had held me helpless for many, many years, almost I felt, from childhood or even before that. I also understood that I had not entered into it willingly.

The mantrap felt so familiar. I had been there a very long time. I was wounded by the iron jaws and my muscles felt taut with the stress of trying to get relief. I was laying down on the ground and every time I tried to move, the iron jaws dug deeper.

I became aware of Jesus looking at me, there was such compassion coming from Him to me. I felt He was asking if I was willing to be released and if I would be able to bear the pain that I would feel as the lifeblood began to circulate. I said I was willing to suffer any pain to be free, free to follow Jesus and Him alone, and not care what people might say or think of me.

I went forward for Communion and as I returned to my seat I became aware of the Cross on the wall and as I looked at it, it began to look more like a key.

I was aware that the key would open the lock on the mantrap and so I began to ask for the key to be used to set me free. Again I was prepared for pain.

But as the key was turned, instead of pain I felt great rushes of fresh air entering my lungs, I could move, I could stand up, and no pain at all. The mantrap melted into the ground and I was given to understand that Jesus had already borne all the pain for me - on the



Cross; He had the right and the authority to release me completely. I also became aware that He had not wanted me, for one moment, to be entrapped, that He had been drawing me closer and closer to Himself and to total commitment at whatever the cost and once I made that commitment, I was totally free.

As I continued, sitting quietly in my seat, I became conscious that from now on I was free to come into the presence of God, through Jesus, and that I could now come freely and know complete acceptance, not through any merit of my own but purely and simply because I had surrendered my own will, my own desires, my hopes and dreams. I was free to simply be myself; there were no barriers, conditions, laws or stipulations. I could come openly and freely into His Presence and He would welcome me, as He always had, with unconditional love. I didn't have to try to please Him any more - or be afraid - I could just be me because He knows my heart.

My fear had always been of being rejected for getting things wrong, of making a mistake but as I surrendered to what I thought would be pain and agony, the iron fetters not only broke but melted into the ground.

Music Review: Asaph Music

This beautiful music is produced by Jon Newman and Rich Garner, who describe it as 'prophetic playing', which is led by the Holy Spirit.'

There are two CDs, 'Anthems of Ascent' (double CD) and 'The River'. One of my favourite tracks is 'Wide as the Ocean' from 'The River' and includes the beautiful sounds of whales, which I find particularly moving. Jon and Rich write: "We were inspired to add some sound samples of real whale song. Not only were we thinking about the vastness and wonder of His creation but there is something serene and peaceful about those whales. Thinking on from this we recalled the old chorus, "Wide, wide as the ocean, high as the heaven above; Deep, deep as the deepest sea is my Saviour's love", which became the inspiration for the track name.

www.asaphmusic.org.uk where there is a lot of information, and from where the music can be downloaded.

Asaph music has blessed people in many walks of life, from children with special needs to folk in care homes. Each CD provides the perfect atmosphere for meditation, prayer times, stillness with the Lord or simply as background music. In fact I have had it playing a lot while putting this magazine together.

The River was recorded at CCHC during a men's weekend in 2014 when Jon and Rich were providing live inspirational instrumental music to support the weekend.

Track 3 on the CD, entitled 'The River' is described by Jon and Rich 'as a recurring theme during the two days at Crowhurst, and that this track paints a picture of that river.'

With Christmas just around the corner, these CDs would make ideal presents, and help bring calm amidst the often hectic preparation before, and after the Christmas season. They can be purchased from the CCHC's bookstall.

On the day I returned from my August stay at Crowhurst, I posted the following on Facebook: "Went to Crowhurst with long-standing back and shoulder pain. All gone. Just saying!" As I write, two days later, that



pain is still notably absent.

I have used a wheelchair for my whole life; a lifetime of sitting means that back and shoulder pain have just become a normal part of my body's rhythm, especially in recent years.

When I discovered on my last morning at CCHC that I could stretch without pain, neither did my back hurt when I got into my chair, it was a surprise and a delight – not least because that pain has accumulated over years and at no point during my stay had I prayed about my back or shoulders – it never crossed my mind to do it, it had just become 'usual'. Of course, the relief of pain is extraordinary but to really explain the beauty of what unfolded for me 'in Christ' across my week at Crowhurst, I have to tell a circular story.

I have stayed at the CCHC a few times; I choose to go and find peace and rest after especially busy times in my work and church life – it is a place 'of God' and I am always blessed by my time there. Over the course of this most recent visit, God challenged me gently in a number of ways and helped me face some fears I didn't even know I had - until I was faced with them. In facing my fears I was blessed by the kindness and care of several of the staff who just listened and helped me put things in their proper place – there is something about Crowhurst which just makes the release of pain possible; I am certain the Spirit of God moves through this place and coaxes the pain from you.

I have come to realise that God knew better than I did I had things to face. He also knows how stubborn I can be - and by a mix of precision engineering and astonishing choreography that only He could manage, He put me right where I needed to be - to face my fears and let them go.

Have I wondered why God stopped my back pain when I didn't ask? Of course I have - and to attempt an answer, I need to tell you the rest of the story. My disability means that I am fairly static. I have two basic postures - sitting or lying and when I lie down, I can't really move or turn over unless I wake - I wake in the same position that I went to sleep. On my last morning at the Centre, I reached above my head to turn on the light and couldn't reach it. Somehow, in the night I had meandered down to the end of the bed and my feet were over the end - no bad dreams and no memory of waking to drag myself down the bed! I discovered my shoulders didn't hurt when I was groping for the light!

been afraid but see, I am in command. I can take your pain and I can help you move." God knows that just sometimes I need things 'writ large!' Not surprisingly, I have been in reflective mood since I got home. I have received the love, healing and peace of God in spades – freely given. His grace is extraordinary, as is that of the staff through whom He works and I am beyond thankful. By way of encouragement, I also say this. Wherever you are with God, his gently irrepressible Spirit dwells here, and in it you can find peace and healing. Just be who



Celebrating Animals!



Who can imagine a world without animals? Apart from being companions, animals are a huge help to humans all over the world, serving in so many different ways. Dogs in particular can work in a variety of roles, and horses can be great therapy for children with special needs who might have difficulty communicating with adults.

Some of you may know the old hymn -Think of a world without any flowers. The second verse is particularly appropriate when we think about animals:

"Think of the world without any animals, think of a field without any herd; think of a stream without any fishes, think of a dawn without any bird. We thank You, Lord, for all your living creatures, we thank you, Lord, and praise Your holy name."

When I wrote in last year's summer magazine, about my cat Purdey (pictured above) recovering from a series of illnesses, folk at CCHC would often ask after her and this would lead on to discussion about guests' pets. During a recent stay, I was chatting to Rosemary, a regular visitor to CCHC. She has a magnificent cat called 'Lord Logan', who sounds a real character and such great company for Rosemary.

Pets are very important, providing companionship and fun and they also play an important part in our physical and mental well being. When they get sick it can be worrying and upsetting and I know it's not unknown for folk to put their pets' names on the Crowhurst Prayer List!

Sadly Purdey's condition worsened and in October I had to make that horrible decision that every pet owner dreads, to have her put to sleep. It was so difficult to know what to do because she has recovered from illness many times and I wondered whether she might do so again, but as I sat with her in the vet's surgery, heart and head in conflict, I prayed for wisdom and discernment and felt clearly that God was telling me to let her go.

Initially I felt guilty at the depth of my grieving for Purdey because she was an animal and not a human, but understanding people have pointed out to me that our pets make such a connection with us and it is OK to mourn their loss, which made me feel better. I have also been assured that as well as seeing our human loved ones in heaven, we will see our pets also because they too were our loved ones; and I have read quotes from several Christian authors, including C S Lewis, James Herriot and even the well known evangelist, Billy Graham, who all believe our pets go to Heaven.

During the Prayer Partners Weekend, the CCHC held a party to honour King Jesus. Everyone looked very smart! One of the Prayer Partners, Audrey, even wore a hat, "because", she said, "when you have an audience with our Queen, you wear a hat, so why not for our King!"

I have been to many services at the CCHC over the years but I don't think I have ever experienced one like this before! The large chapel was full and the whole service was about honouring Jesus, King of everything and especially at the CHCC. The worship was powerful and the Lord's presence so tangible. A chair had been placed in front of the altar and we were asked to imagine Jesus sitting on His throne, gathered in our midst as we praised and worshipped Him. There was banner waving and dancing, in the aisles and around the altar. It was so joyful!

Steve said that the team had been on a 'journey of repentance' and have been led to ask if they were out of tune in any way? The Lord must always be Head of the CCHC and when we acknowledge this, we KNOW that His presence is going to increase.

A time of confession followed and Jesus was declared as King, the God who sits on His mercy seat, extending mercy to those who come to Him. The previous evening, the Prayer Partners had a vision of angels' wings covering the Centre.

Veronica thanked God for all He had done at the Centre, for Howard Cobb who obeyed the Lord's calling ninety years ago and for all who have served here, enabling the work to continue, materially and spiritually. Through the years He has been our Lord and Saviour, Prophet, Priest and King.

A declaration was made by Nigel, Suzanne Veronica and Steve, that the team would remain true to the call of the Lord and walk always in obedience, and we were all asked to repeat the declaration.

An open time of prayer followed for those who felt led by the Lord to pray out loud or give words of knowledge. Someone read from Isaiah 6:1 "I saw the Lord high and lifted up" and this is exactly what we were doing at the service!

One thought which really struck me was that Jesus is ALWAYS on the throne, whether we are on a mountain top or in a valley.

During the preparation of Communion, Steve said that there are over a billion people who recognise Jesus as King and when we went up to receive the Bread and Wine, he suggested that we might like to bow before the empty chair - which represented the throne of God – to acknowledge His presence with us. It was very humbling to do this and to see everyone bowing - it really put Christ in His rightful place.

We finished with Graham Kendrick's rousing song, 'The Lord is Marching out in splendour' (O give thanks to the Lord for His love endures), after which Stephen played an Israeli song, to which many folk got up and danced in a circle around the altar. I don't think anyone wanted the service to end; we were truly soaking in the Lord's presence.

A Ploughman's lunch was provided and we all shared a lovely time of fellowship in the dining room before departing and leaving the Prayer Partners to continue with their weekend!





Maintenance news

We are at that wonderful time of year when the leaves are starting to drop and the colours are slowly changing. One of our best leaf clearing volunteers, Cliff, 'retired' from CCHC in September, but we now have a secret weapon all the way from the USA – an electric leaf mulcher, which should really help.

Cliff was also partly responsible for taking away the kitchen recyclable waste, but we now have two compost bins situated by the polytunnel so more easily accessible.

During November 1000 more tulip bulbs were planted, as last year's planting was very well received, so that will keep Desmond busier than normal!

We now have a nice new set of double gates at the bottom of the station path, which give a more welcoming feel.



There is a small area of waste ground in front of the polytunnel that we are praying about what to do with and we are exploring the idea of an allotment. It would need some organisation and planning and this may be beneficial for guests to do some gardening, as well as supplying the kitchen with occasional fresh vegetables, salads and herbs etc. If this might be of interest, please contact me via the office to discuss it further. We can supply all the tools required and the polytunnel could be made available if required.

Please do spread the word if you know anyone who may be interested.

We have bought five new benches for the patio area and moved the existing ones to various positions along the prayer walk. An additional four benches are now situated around the Freedom Garden.



All the front windows of the main building have now been replaced with uPVC to match the fire escape doors and an additional small window has been created in room 11.1 think you will agree that the appearance of the front of the building is greatly enhanced.

One major bit of news is that after much deliberation and surveys, it was decided that the bungalow is to be demolished and a new, purpose built, eco-friendly and accessible timber framed kit-house is to take its place. The cost of refurbishment and upgrading the existing property was not deemed viable. At present we are only at the planning stage and nothing will be done until the New Year, but this is just to give notice that construction work will be happening within the next few months.

Next year already looks to be very busy in the grounds, so this feels like the calm before the storm, which isn't a bad thing.

At a farewell tea, Cliff was presented with a lovely framed montage of photos (which Jayne from the office had put together) showing him at work in various places around the grounds over the last five years.


Cliff and I are next door neighbours and he originally discovered CCHC after seeing me come back a very different person following my first visit in 1996!

Christians in Conflict Teaching Day with Denis Smith

It began on Friday afternoon when we all met up over tea and found out the topic we would explore together. I had no idea how exciting and very challenging the weekend would turn out to be for me personally.


Our introductory session on Friday evening was looking together at where our identity comes from as women. As we broke into small groups, we reflected how society and many factors have influenced who we are.
