ear All,
"In God we make our boast all day long, and we will praise your name forever." Psalm 44:8.

At the time of writing this letter in September, Veronica and I will have been here at Crowhurst Christian Healing Centre (CCHC) for six years. We have a long way to go to equal or better our founders, Howard and May Cobb's 22 years! What a time of blessing and change these years have been. For us personally it has been a time of growth in the Lord, and a time of healing. It has also been a huge privilege leading such a great team. We have much to thank God for.

As we move into our seventh year, Veronica and I have reflected on things we have learnt since working at CCHC and briefly share something of our thoughts below.

Steve: I sometimes say, 'God is good all the time' and often that seems to fly in the face of the circumstances that surround us — be it here at CCHC, locally, nationally or at international level. How can God be good when we see so much suffering? I don't believe that God is the author of the suffering. On the contrary, I believe in God as Creator, giving mankind the perfect opportunity for paradise on earth (how good is that?) I believe in God as Saviour, as seen in the death, burial

and resurrection of Jesus, giving mankind the perfect opportunity for new beginnings — God's will be done, His kingdom come on earth as it is in heaven. God is the author of life and I have seen Him on countless occasions since we have been here, restoring, redeeming, reshaping and transforming people's lives from darkness to light. For me, God IS good all the time. My faith and trust in Him is stronger as a result of our being here.


Veronica: I have found these six years to be challenging in many respects and growth has come from learning to lean on the Lord through those challenges. People often say, correctly, how fortunate we are to live and work in such a beautiful and God-centred environment. However, close proximity to the Lord will always show up our own weaknesses and shortcomings, and for me working through these into a place of closer trust and intimacy with Him has at times been very painful, but it is a price worth paying as He leads me to increasing freedom and a much deeper revelation of Himself, and His Kingdom. Truly, "no eye has seen, no ear has heard, no mind has conceived what God has prepared for those who love him." (1 Cor 2:9)

Veronica and I know something of the value of talking about our faith journey. The Psalms encourage us again and again to tell of all the Lord is doing — with praise. I found myself saying recently, that when we speak the name of the Lord openly, our words are fuel for the fire of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit gets so excited when Jesus is at the centre of our lives and conversations that He turns our mere words and actions into divine activity. The result is — the kingdom of God advances.

Celebrating the Diamond Jubilee of Ray Jones' Ordination



Ray Jones, the much loved former Warden at Crowhurst, celebrated 60 years of ordained ministry at a wonderful service on Sunday 30th September. The church of St Andrew, Steyning was packed with family and friends from his very full career — from the present and previous parishes, the Royal Navy and from Crowhurst.

After a warm welcome from Fr Mark Heather, the Incumbent of the parish, Ray led much of the service. Ray's wife, Maureen, read the first lesson and the Revd Simon Woodley, who worked at Crowhurst in Ray's time, read the second.

Ray preached in his own inimitable style and knowing that some folk there were not Christians, Ray spoke powerfully on the title — 'A Witness'. In essence he outlined his journey of faith, moving easily between pathos and humour. He described movingly the loss of his brother at the age

of 12, followed by the death of his father not long after in an accident, and then his own serious polio condition.

Ray was ordained in September 1958 and in 1966 became a Chaplain in the Royal Navy. It was in the R.N. that Ray discovered renewal and saw God healing.

Ray left the Navy in 1989 to become Warden and Director at Crowhurst. He told stories of seeing God at work and this must have left a deep impression on those in the congregation who have not committed themselves to the Lord. He also encouraged the whole congregation.

Later Ray presided at the service of Holy Eucharist and it was a real privilege to receive the Communion from him.

After the service everyone joined in with the refreshments in the church hall, where there were photographs showing different aspects of Ray and Maureen's life.

It is a very significant achievement to attain 60 years of ordained ministry and very few people now being ordained will achieve that. Not only has Ray achieved this, he is still making an active contribution in the life of his local church. May God bless him as so many people have been blessed through Ray's ministry over the years.

Ray served as Warden of Crowhurst from 1989 to 1997, with his wife Maureen responsible for the running of the house. Their attitude was that 'nothing is too good for God' and they quickly won the hearts of guests and staff alike. Thy do some things have the ability to catch your attention in a second? The title of this article is deliberately constructed to stimulate curiosity and to make you feel like you are missing out on something if you don't read on! Our brains are on a constant search for things that:

- satisfy our important needs;
- are novel, spark curiosity and are cute (studies have shown that we are wired to be distracted by cute things!) and,
- provide us with escapism from our current situation.

I wonder what it was about the Crowhurst Parish that caught Howard Cobb's attention when he advertised for a Parish swap in 1928? What made the Crowhurst Parish stand out from the other invitations he received? The lack of running water, gas and electricity can't have been a lure and moving from a busy London Parish to rural East Sussex might have seemed, to some, like a backward step. However, the Rectory had its advantages, most notably the fact that it was large, which would have satisfied his search for somewhere to grow the healing ministry.

The move would have taken great courage and sacrifice. Such a decision would only have been made because Howard was trusting that God was calling him here. "*Trust in the LORD*

with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding." (Proverbs 3:51). Howard had no way of knowing that the result of his obedience to God would be 90 years of people experiencing God's healing here.

Part of the reason for having a weekend for Crowhurst villagers was because Howard started his ministry in the heart of the Crowhurst community as Rector of Crowhurst at St George's Church and it was fitting to celebrate Holy Communion, a Sacrament that Howard was passionate about, with the villagers at St George's Church at a special service on Sunday.

In 1931 Howard wrote a book called "Christ Fulfilling in the Sacrament of Holy Communion", which was used during the service, and a wreath in memory of Howard and May was placed on their memorial in the Churchyard. A number of Howard and May's grandchildren and other family members were able to attend the service and witness the result of the recent restoration to the Cobb memorial.

In true Crowhurst tradition, a succulent Sunday roast was prepared by the kitchen team for those returning from the service. Local people often confess to being unaware of what goes on at CCHC and so sharing food with people provided a good opportunity for us to unveil the mystery and talk about what

we do. Folk were also given a tour of the house and grounds and even those who would admit to having little or no faith commented on the peace and atmosphere, which we know to be the presence of God.

However, for many villagers the appeal of CCHC's famed food and hospitality simply wasn't enough to draw them in, and so wanting to bless and include as many people in the weekend as possible, we came up with the idea of 'God Rocks'. If people were unable to come to us, we would take some CCHC joy to them. These beautifully painted rocks, decorated by guests over the last nine months, were hidden in the Recreation Ground for people to find.

Our prayer was that this small act of kindness would bring joy and cheer to those who found one. I witnessed one boy find a God Rock on the climbing frame. He could barely contain his excitement as he proudly took his treasure to show his mother. Jesus told a parable about hidden treasure. "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field. When a man found it, he hid it again, and then in his joy went and sold all he had and bought that field." Matt 13:44.

God Rocks also provided great entertainment for the children who joined us with their families at the village BBQ on Saturday. Rocks were painted in the art room, hidden and re-hidden many times over — there may still be one or two in the CCHC grounds yet to be discovered!

As I reflect back on the weekend, I wonder how the Holy Spirit has been at work prompting villagers to join us over the weekend? How has the Holy Spirit used our advertising to grab people's attention and how will He use the links that we have made to extend the Kingdom of God to bless

more people in the village and beyond? Like Howard, when he started his ministry, we can't see into the future and we can't fully know God's plans, but we believe that He is at work, and we are open to how He wants to grab our attention and bless the local community.

From a Crowhurst Villager:

I wanted to send an email to thank yourself, Veronica and the other members of the team at CCHC for the superb hospitality you laid on over the Village Weekend. My wife, the girls and I really enjoyed ourselves and it was great to meet other members of the team, have a look around and find out about the history and vision for the future. My stay whilst only short was a real blessing to me and I will definitely be back again.

More importantly though, was how positive everyone else I spoke to were about the Centre. Friends I spoke to were impressed by how welcoming, friendly and approachable everyone was, how good the food and hospitality was and I know they really valued finding out what the Centre is about.

Never discount the Power of Prayer!



n Maundy Thursday, as I was driving to CCHC for the Easter Retreat, my car brakes failed on the A21 as I approached a very busy roundabout. I pulled the car over to the left, went up a very steep bank, bounced between two street lights, bounced back on to the road and came to a halt in the middle of the road at a bollard. I was covered in glass from the windscreen and while I was gathering my wits about me, an off duty fireman came to the front door and told me not to move. He asked if I was in any pain — I was not — and his mate joined him. No other vehicles or people seem to have been involved, although there were a number around.

About ten minutes later we were joined by a lady doctor on her way to work; she checked my neck and upper back. The fire brigade, ambulance and police arrived and after some initial checks and the removal of the driver's door, I was stretchered out of my car, clamped on to a hard board and taken to Tunbridge Wells hospital, feeling

very uncomfortable. My son, Gordon, had been informed by the police and arrived while I was waiting for an X-ray and a CT scan. Other checks were also done. Staff and the police were amazed that I had come out of the accident so well. I told them I believed in the God of Miracles and a Filipino nurse who was on duty said she did too.

The doctor told me that someone of my age involved in this sort of accident would normally have been kept in and had other tests done, but as all the checks had been satisfactory I was able to be discharged into Gordon's care. I had to have something to eat and provided this stayed down, I was free to go. A nurse came to remove a cannula, but I told her I didn't have one — she had difficulty believing I had no pain!

I was wheeled to Gordon's car and we both went back to the damaged car as he had to locate it for insurance purposes.

It was now around 8.30pm and dark, and just as Gordon went to my car a van turned up containing the two off duty firemen who had been there in the morning! They were able to reassure me that the drivers behind my car had noticed my brake lights were on, which was a great blessing to me. Angels in disguise maybe? They were amazed that I had been discharged so quickly.

Soon after arriving at Gordon's House, I went to bed. I had difficulty crawling up the stairs and felt very tired and wobbly but fell asleep almost immediately. I woke around 2.30am and after checking I was still alive and all my limbs were working I thought 'whoever is preventing me from going to Crowhurst IS NOT GOING TO WIN.' I went back to sleep again and after

breakfast Gordon drove me the 100 miles to Crowhurst. The folks in my church had heard about the accident and the prayer chain was in action, as well as the prayers at Crowhurst. *Never discount the power of prayer!*

The Easter Retreat was wonderful and God's provision continued when a guest offered me a lift to Upminster on the Monday morning. (Two others had been prepared to drive me to Dartford where one of my family would meet me, even though they would have to drive back the forty miles to Crowhurst.) We had a very clear journey with no hold ups although I understand the tunnel was blocked twice in the afternoon.

My spectacularly coloured bruises cleared up and I can only give thanks to the God of miracles and the power of prayer. My harp and possible halo have been dusted down and replaced on a shelf for a later time!

The insurance company paid up very quickly and I have a replacement car!

Since my last article six months ago, a lot of changes have taken place. The main news on the staff front is that after ten years of faithful and unremitting service, Desmond the gardener has 'retired'. I want to personally thank him on everyone's behalf for the incredible hard work he put in over the years to maintain the high standards that have created such wonderful grounds to enjoy. His farewell was a very emotional time and we wish him all the best in his future plans.

Unfortunately the same week, our wonderful volunteer, Dave 'The Stickman', also decided to move on and has re-located to Bath. Both were amazing characters around CCHC and will be greatly missed.

However, the great news is that we have now employed a new full-time gardener. His name is Trevor Rickaby and by the time you read this magazine, he will have been on the team since 1st October. This is a very exciting and a huge opportunity for CCHC in developing the grounds and gardens, so watch this space!

In addition, my wife, Estelle, has been, and will continue to work on Fridays as long as she is needed to look after the grounds, keeping the beds looking tidy and deweeded.

The other news of course is the new-build bungalow. At the time of writing the walls and roof are on, and the roof is now fully tiled. Next stage is first-fix electrics (including underfloor heating) and plumbing. Things are moving on quickly every day. Completion is due in November (but don't quote me!)

With the very hot and dry summer, the grass was looking very brown, but has started to recover incredibly well. The leaves are now starting to fall in earnest so it will be a real challenge this year without our volunteers who used to rake them on a daily basis.

The house was closed for a week in September to enable maintenance, refurbishment and decorating works to be done.

In the grounds we have had some hedge reduction work carried out, which has opened up the vista across the valley (see photos on page 11 and 23). It's all been quite a challenge but well worth it!

We have also taken the opportunity to replace the outside doors in rooms 9 and 10 to help with access onto the patio area. These have greatly enhanced the appearance of the rooms.

Other changes include the redecorating of the entrance, lobby, staircase and landing, replacing the flat roof of the Chapel link-corridor and improved drainage.

It's exciting to see so many changes happening so quickly, with the opportunities they bring, and as we head into Autumn/Winter and the nights draw in, we stand in awe of God's perfect timing and absolute Grace.



Prayer is such an important part of the ministry of Crowhurst and we have over 200 faithful Prayer Partners who pray daily for the needs of the Centre, including accommodation, grounds, team, guests and the Prayer Ministers.

The Lord meets us where we are

met Marian in June this year when we were both staying at Crowhurst. As we were chatting, she mentioned a Project she wrote in 1987 about three aspects of healing in various settings. Marian had placements with a Hospital Chaplaincy, a Counselling Centre and a Centre for Healing, which was CCHC. I asked whether she would like to share some of her Project for our magazine and below is the section which relates to her time at Crowhurst. Although her memories may go back to the Eighties, they are not out of place in this issue as we have been celebrating our 90th Anniversary this year and remembering all that the Lord has done at CCHC over the last nine decades.

Marian's section about Crowhurst

Crowhurst Christian Healing Centre is a haven of peace, a calm, friendly building set in most beautiful gardens with two chapels. An atmosphere of peace and healing pervaded the whole place.

We were shown round by the Chaplain, Revd David Howell. He explained the history of the place and how Howard Cobb, after being healed himself, felt he had a call from God to found a 'Home of Healing' where those who were sick and troubled could come for counsel, prayer and the laying on of hands for healing.

The atmosphere of peace and tranquillity is the gift of God through hundreds of praying friends, many daily 'tuning in' in intercession to their services at 10am and 6pm. Local people and visitors are welcome to attend the healing services.

There is an open door and guests, not patients, come to find what they are seeking in this stressful world, some to find peace

and quiet, some to find inner healing of mind and spirit, some to find physical healing, some to gain spiritual refreshment and renewal. The Church is rediscovering her healing ministry, fulfilling our Lord's commission to 'preach the Kingdom and heal the sick.'

I believe that what I have learned from my visits to the hospital, the counselling centre and the centre for healing, is that God is with us always and loves us, and wants us to be whole. He made us in His image, body, mind and spirit, and to be a whole person we must be open to Him and nurture our physical, emotional and spiritual being.

All the three areas serve people in need and the people who serve do so trusting in the grace of God to work through them. We should commit the whole situation to God, "Just as I am", accepting that He will use it for good, trusting that He has His own way of restoring us to wholeness.

Praying in Colour

ike other Christians I know, I have tried many methods of prayer over the years, and read several books on the subject. Intercession is something I find easy and when praying for folk when ministering with laying on of hands I can concentrate, but when I have tried so many times to "Be Still and Know that I am God", I find dozens of thoughts whirling around my head, intruding into my quiet space.

However all that changed a couple of weeks ago when I discovered a book called "Praying in Color, Drawing a New Path to God" by Sybil MacBeth (an American as you can guess from the spelling!)ISBN 978-1-55725-512-9 Paraclete Press.

The author explains it as a new prayer form which gives God an invitation and a new door to penetrate the locked cells of our hearts and minds. She has been leading workshops across the USA using prayer in colour for nearly a decade.

To pray this way you need paper and coloured pencils or pens. You do not need to be able to draw!

I begin by just drawing a random shape on the paper and then write the name of someone on my mind inside the shape. I then just start doodling around the shape and add colour, sometimes adding other words. Fifteen minutes to a half hour pass as I do this and I find my mind has not wandered at all as I concentrate on the person or situation.

I then either put the picture somewhere I will see it as I carry on my busy life, or alternatively I take a photo of it on my phone to have it by me if I have done it in my prayer journal and do not want to tear the page out.

I am still new to this but find exploring this method of praying very exciting and refreshing. Below is what I drew during my prayer time.



The book also explains how to practice Lectio Divina in this way. As you read a short passage of Scripture you write it out slowly, highlight the words which speak to you and meditate on those words. There are other ideas to use Praying in Colour during Advent and Lent that I am looking forward to exploring, for example making your own Advent calendar!

This book has opened up for me a treasure trove of ideas for new ways of praying. I am reminded of the Bible verse I was given during a Healing weekend at Crowhurst that I attended earlier this year:

"See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland." Isaiah 43:19
