Our Senior Chaplain Writes...



Dear friends,

I would like to thank all who have sent encouraging words about the magazine and those who have sent donations to help fund it; both are much

appreciated. 'Thank-you' are such important words for they value the giver and affirm that we have received their gifts.

How true this is of Thanksgiving Day – a day when we focus on our amazing God, the giver of all good things, and reflect on what we have received over the past year. And how much we have received. It was as we gave thanks that this became abundantly clear.

And something else became very clear. For over a year the Lord has been saying about this Centre, "See I am doing a new thing" (Isaiah 43: 19) and we have been watching and waiting for this 'new thing'. It was as I was preparing for Thanksgiving Day that the next part of the quotation, "Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?" jumped out at me.

For the past year we have been aiming to build up a new Chaplaincy Team following Peter and Kay's retirement in July 2009, and also knowing that Margaret would be retiring in June 2010. Initially we were seeking a new Senior Chaplain but drew a blank until our Lord made it abundantly clear that I should take on that position. There's a new thing – a woman leading the Crowhurst Christian Healing Centre!

With a Senior Chaplain in post we began the process to appoint a deputy Senior Chaplain and Associate Chaplains. Again we have drawn a blank, so far. But what we have seen is the development of gifts within the Ministry Team, also new members, with their own specific gifts, added to the team. The art and music ministries are growing and bearing fruit and we now have members of our Ministry Team more involved in the Healing Retreat weekends.

We are also seeing more people offering to take on the role of Visiting Chaplain. These invaluable contributors to the ministry of this place spend a day, a few days, a week or more leading worship, offering ministry and generally being available to the guests. In addition to this the Lord is showing us people with the gifts and skills to lead teaching days and themed weekends. On Thanksgiving Day Penny, a member of our Ministry Team was anointed as an Associate Chaplain. So much is happening.

The Lord is certainly doing a 'new thing' and I am sure there is more to come. As times of change bring with them vulnerability, it is vital that we wait on the Lord to discern His will for this

place. We still need more full time chaplains and I believe that as we continue to perceive this 'new thing' He is doing and seek to put it into effect, then He will provide the people to bring His plans to fruition.

Healing the family tree

A JOURNEY TO HOPE

On Friday 14th May I find myself driving on the A12 towards the destination of The Old Rectory. "What am I doing?" I ask myself, "driving alone, some 200 plus miles away to stay the weekend in a place I don't know, with people I don't know!" But what I did know was that I felt prompted to go there via my dear friend and sister in Christ, Barbara Eagling, who had previously visited the Centre and had picked up a leaflet on 'Healing the Family Tree', which she believed 'had my name on it'! The title beckoned, given my adoptive status and subsequent adult experiences, which had encouraged a spirit of rejection and abandonment inside me. How good God is to lead me towards His healing heart.

I managed to take the wrong route on my Journey to Sussex and ended up on the road to Brands Hatch! I found myself in a pub where the one solitary customer turned out to be a retired lorry driver – praise God! He set me on the right road and I eventually arrived at the Centre, where I booked in and wandered round the rambling beautiful grounds before afternoon tea and the first session of the themed programme.

The five sessions were:

- Down the generations.
- 2. Our ties to others and the past.
- 3. Our relationships with those who have died.
- 4. Truth, forgiveness and freedom.
- 5. The Eucharist and after.

What I learned most during the weekend was that the offering of forgiveness must come from the heart. Forgiveness of self, forgiveness towards others, even to someone who has died must be commended to God, in love. Simply, here is the most powerful weapon that God has equipped us with. Love has more power than hatred. Love sustains, love frees others permanently.

We were encouraged to write Jesus a letter, which we took to the Sunday morning Communion and Healing service. For me, this Healing Service was incredible in its spirit-led intensity. It commenced with praise, worship and a time of reconciliation, after which each of us silently re-read our letter, prayerfully forgiving and seeking forgiveness and commending it all into God's all-powerful, all-loving care.

After the service we all made a burnt offering of our letters, the smoke billowing upwards in the breeze as incense to our Father God. I was very aware of a feeling of release, freedom and hope.

Was it just me or did everyone make their individual journey home seeing their environment, future circumstances and relationships with greater understanding, discernment and hopefulness?

I thank God for this opportunity to receive His healing and wholeness.

The Water Feature

Some keen eyed visitors will have noticed over the past few months that the water spout has on occasions not been working. This has not been a deliberate move to save electricity! The problem was that we were losing water through cracks in the 'pond'. This had gradually got worse and in the end we were losing something like three gallons a day. Action had to be taken!

With the aid of our ever-willing volunteer, Cliff, we set to work by firstly emptying the remaining water and then removing all the stones, large and small, followed by all the lower levels of finer shingle. Then with Herculean strength we lifted out the 'Hands' water receiver and the other slightly lighter water outlet.

After cleaning the pond a few thin cracks were discovered in the brickwork. With the cracks repaired and all of the brickwork given three coats of sealer, it was just the 'small task!' of putting it back together again (with Cliff giving the larger stones a good scrub).

I'm pleased to report that the repairs appear to be successful and I trust that any future ground movement will not produce any further cracks.

Secondly God has blessed us with a deeper and fuller ministry of Intercession. We pray nearly every day for Christians worldwide as well as locally, bringing 'Words of life',





especially through Pamela, that have paralleled and undergirded the continuing ministry and happenings at the Centre. It is a high privilege to still serve in the Lord Jesus' healing ministry in this way.

Alas in the wider church the healing ministry is still very much peripheral and mostly undertaken as an 'add on' instead of seeing it as a Gospel imperative. But even here the Lord is at work and we are often surprised by the answers to prayer as He touches lives in His gentleness and compassion.

The Lord also opened up opportunities to intercede for areas of North Wales, which had experienced the hand of darkness in the past, and had now come into a new place of light and healing.

Thirdly, the Lord has also opened up for us whole areas of creativity. For Pamela it has been in the area of embroidery and design. For Trevor it has been in wildlife and countryside conservation studies, especially to do with birds and their habitats. These creative activities have led us both to widen our areas of interest. Even Trevor has enjoyed embroidery classes, and together we share in painting classes and enjoy new discoveries.



I Am A Forgiven Sinner



When I was at Thanksgiving Day in July, Mary Slater asked me what I had been doing since I had left the Centre and wondered whether I would like to write something for the magazine.

It is almost a year ago since my wife and I left Northumberland to move to Dumfries. In doing so I gave up my chaplaincy, my preaching and my teaching on the healing ministry etc. God took the opportunity to insist that I took time out to rest and recharge. Little did I realise what else He was going to do in my life now I had time to look at myself, as well as at my ministry. Reflection and introspection became the order of the day.

As time passed, I found myself engaged in a battle and as each day passed I liked myself less and less, and that was putting it mildly! It came to a head one morning when I even wondered if it was possible to shave with my eyes closed – that way I wouldn't have to look at myself! However I persisted in

my prayer for the people in the area around me, for the local hospital – the staff, patients, visitors etc, and I continued to read and reflect on my daily Bible notes.

Fortunately God persisted too and I was given to understand that it was not His will that I continue to dislike myself when His love for me was so great. He showed me that Satan was having a field day in my life. At that point I told Satan to go in the name of Jesus and asked the Holy Spirit to fill the gaps this left.

It was only then that I realised how much darkness there had been. Yes, I was a sinner but God directed me to the song, "I stand amazed in the presence of Jesus the Nazarene".

This was followed by God reinforcing His love for me, by taking me through the Garden of Eden story, and His joy at being able to walk with His children in the cool of the evening.

And also:

Once again God could walk with His children in a risen Lord Jesus. The price had been paid, and with the love that had occasioned such sacrifice came the gift of forgiveness and restoration.

God made it clear that He would continue His work in me, and through me, in the lives of others. How this will happen I am still not sure. Perhaps Mary could ask me the same question next year!

I asked for love and God gave me troubled people to help


I asked for favours and God gave me opportunities


I received nothing I wanted

I was recently browsing through the many CD's that are on sale at the Centre and my eyes were drawn to 'The Best of Celtic Worship.' Several different artists have contributed to this excellent CD which at the low price of just £4.99 is an absolute bargain!

It is always risky buying a CD that you haven't heard before, but Robin Mark is one of my favourite singer/songwriters and he was listed as singing five of the ten songs so I thought it wouldn't be too much of a gamble! I certainly wasn't disappointed and would thoroughly recommend it, even if you aren't familiar with any of the singers.

There isn't room on this page to review every song but I would like to mention a few of them. Kathryn Scott was new to me but I am definitely a fan now! Her moving rendition of 'At the Foot of the Cross' really spoke to me when I first listened to it. The lyrics and gentle music combine to make this one of my favourite tracks on the CD. It is a song that takes you right to the heart of the cross, and helps you to meditate on the sacrifice that Jesus made for us when He willingly died in our place. The words encourage us to lay every burden down at the foot of the cross. It is very powerful and very stirring.

'When it's all been said and done', sung by Robin Mark, focuses on whether we have really lived our lives for God. Have we done our best to live for truth, and for Our Lord? It is a beautiful song and one which really emphasises God's love and purpose for our lives.
