What's in a name?

Names are very powerful and can evoke many thoughts depending on the association of the name.

Take the Crowhurst Christian Healing Centre. When we speak of it in conversation, we will usually affectionately refer to it as 'Crowhurst' but in writing, we refer to it with its full title, or the CCHC, the Centre and sometimes Crowhurst. I know whenever I talk about this special place, I get a feeling of joy, peace and thankfulness, because I know how much I have been blessed by the Lord there over the years.

When Revd Howard Hobb began his ministry in 1928, the Centre was known as The Rectory. Later it became known as 'The Old Rectory'.

Speaking of names, the office recently received some old Crowhurst publications in the post and discovered that the much loved pond (pictured on page 2) is actually called 'Spring Pond', and the field on the Prayer Walk is called 'Church Meadow'. Something to reflect on when you next walk or sit in the beautiful grounds.

Names were particularly important in Biblical times. God has many names - Adonai, El Shaddai, Elohim, to name just a few, and when Moses asked God what he should call Him, God replied ... "I AM WHO I AM." *This is what*

you are to say to the Israelites: "I AM has sent me to you." (Exodus 3:14).

Abraham's name means 'Father of many nations' (Genesis 17:5). Abraham and his wife, Sarah, named their son Isaac, which in Hebrew means laughter. Both had laughed when God told them Sarah would have a child at the age of 90. I think I would have laughed too but the lesson then, and now, is never to underestimate God because we know that with Him, all things are possible!


Thanksgiving Day: Saturday 16th July 2016

Many of you are aware of the importance of gift aiding your donations. There is no catch; it is absolutely legitimate providing you pay enough tax to the Inland Revenue each year to cover the gift aided element, either in Income Tax or Capital Gains Tax. The Government gives us back 25% of any love gift or donation you give the Crowhurst Christian Healing Centre if you Gift Aid it. So if you give us £20.00, we can claim £5.00 back! Your gift is then worth £25.00. There is no limit; a donation of £200 is worth £250.00 if gift aided! **But you have to ensure you have completed the form and gift aided your donation, otherwise we lose the benefit and that would be sad!**

Although we can't give personal tax advice, we can help you make your donation go further through gift aid. If you wish to consider leaving a legacy in your will, please do the same and we will send you some literature. It really is very simple.

My name is Colin Beadle and I was the Maintenance Manager at the Crowhurst Christian Healing Centre from 1991-2006.

During this period and after retirement, I sometimes served on the ministry team as I am a firm believer in God's power to heal and save. It was a real privilege to serve the Lord in this way and I would like to share my recent experience of God's Healing in my own life.

Whilst in hospital earlier this year, I had a scary experience, which nearly resulted in me dying. All my body was shutting down and I felt like I was slipping away.

On this particular night in hospital, I heard the *Lord speaking to me*. He said, "*Son, it's not yet your time to come home. I still have much for you to do on this earth.*"

Wow! I thought about this for a long time, wondering, how is this going to happen with me so weak etc? The Lord, knowing my thoughts, again spoke, "*My son when you share your testimony about how you have been saved from near death, My Spirit will empower you so you will not be nervous or tongue tied, and what you say will be powerful and to My glory.*"

So, at a suitable moment during the Healing service at the CCHC one Thursday in March, I called out to Steve G that I felt I had something from God to share with the congregation. He

looked round rather startled and seeing how weak I was said, "*If you can make it to me then I will support you, and you can speak into my microphone.*"

God gave me a strength and delivery I had never experienced before. I was able to look at all the congregation (as usual the place was packed, with many folk sitting in the corridor). There were shouts of "**Praise the Lord!**" and other such expressions, with clapping etc. Furthermore it fitted in beautifully with what was later to come in Steve's sermon, the theme of which was, '*Look at that!*'

I am just so grateful to God, who is giving me day by day strength, for whatever He wants me to do and be, and I believe that although I have further tests to go through, He has healed me. Praise His name!

During my entire life I have learnt to trust God whatever life may throw at me, and this is where faith plays a very important part. The Bible talks about faith being the substance of things hoped for and the evidence of things not seen. In Hebrews 12 we read of folk who did amazing things by having faith in God, but none of them received all that God had promised until they were called home.

I am just so thankful to God to have experienced God's healing in my life, and for all those dear friends and family who have prayed for me to be healed.


My first Prayer and Painting Week was in 2003. I would like to thank many people for their love and encouragement, especially

We then reflected on how when a damaged rose bud does not open into a perfect rose, we do not become fully the person God created us to be.

The final session on Saturday was a practical one, 'Restoring the Rose' and we had the afternoon free to either take a walk, use the art room or visit the many prayer stations which had been set up around the house.

I made my way into the newly refurbished prayer rooms for some quiet time with the Lord and as I sat there, the sun finally broke through. I soaked up the wonderful warmth and light and felt Him say to me "You are not a rose, you are a sunflower, always turning to face the sun!" I hurried over to the art room and expressed this thought in a painting, which was so different from my usual style of painting; I felt it expressed the insights I had received, the joy I felt, the healing I had received and a new confidence.

The joyful celebration of the Eucharist on the Sunday with my favourite hymns, including, "Colours of Day", ended a weekend which was both thought provoking and so full of laughter and joy. A huge debt of gratitude is due to the housekeeping staff as well as to Veronica and her team who led this special weekend; it certainly blew away the 'January Blues'!

During a very cold, wet spell of weather in January this year, the Crowhurst Christian Healing Centre held a ladies weekend, entitled 'Redeeming the Rose'. Those of us staying for the whole weekend were joined by many more for the Teaching Day on the Saturday; how we were all cherished and loved during that time!

Around the house were many of Maggie's beautiful rose paintings; there were roses on the tables at mealtimes, with beautifully folded rose serviettes and what a surprise when the dessert arrived at lunchtime - exquisitely and lovingly made 'pastry roses',

All creatures great and small, the Lord God made them all!

Animals play an important part in the lives of many people, and are often the only companions of those who live alone. The Lord knows how important our pets are to us and I believe that He cares when they are ill, and hears our prayers when we pray for them.

My cat, Purdey had a difficult start in life. At just seven months of age, she was found hiding in a hedge, having given birth to six kittens. Two had sadly died but four survived. I 'temporarily' fostered her and the kittens; the girls found a home, but Purdey and the two boys ended up staying with me!

Purdey has an immune disorder, which leaves her vulnerable to infections and recently (not for the first time) she became very ill. One night she was lying next to me on the bed, when suddenly she became very rigid. Her limbs went stiff and she was staring wide eyed, not seeming to know where she was or what was happening. She looked very scared and I feared she was dying. I tried to reassure her and laid hands on her in Jesus' name, praying for her healing, in whatever form that would take - either for her to slip away peacefully or to be fully healed. I told God that I trusted Him in the situation because He had created her and placed her in my care. My main concern at that moment was that she wouldn't suffer any pain or distress.

Almost immediately after my prayers, Purdey settled down and slept soundly throughout the night (which is more than I did as I couldn't relax at all, and kept checking to see whether she was still alive!)

When she woke up in the morning, she was again very poorly with rigid limbs, and when she tried to stand up, kept collapsing. I rushed her to the vet and the two on duty diagnosed epilepsy, on top of all her other problems!

I was told to take her home and monitor her closely. Expecting the worst, I waited for further episodes, but they never occurred!

From the moment we got home from the vets, she has gone from strength to strength, praise the Lord! I knew she was on the mend when she started grooming one of her youngsters (not so young at eight years of age!) She still clearly 'rules the roost!'

I took Purdey back to the vets a few days later for a check up and both were amazed at her remarkable and speedy recovery.

I have laid hands on Purdey on several occasions for the Lord's healing, and have seen her recover from many different health issues, including a reversal of chronic kidney disease and inflammatory arthritis.

I thank God for Purdey's latest healing and also for my kind and knowledgeable vets, who have always been so quick to treat her with the necessary medication when she has been so ill.

A couple of days after Purdey began to recover, I took this cute photo of her with one paw on my Bible. I thought how appropriate; it was as if she was standing on every promise of God's Word! Purdey is definitely a little miracle cat and I thank God for bringing her into my life.

Grounds and Garden news



My name is Kim Vessey. This is my first article since taking over from Geof as Maintenance Manager and what a year! So much has been happening around the grounds

with Des, our gardener, and the team of volunteers all working so hard to keep the grounds looking fantastic. A massive thank you to them. Do come along to Thanksgiving Day and see all the work that has been done.

The Prayer Room and 'Shalom' (the old art room - see photo) are now up and running, and the areas outside have been landscaped with hard and soft features to enhance what God has provided already.

The exterior of the Prayer Rooms is being painted and outside Shalom paving slabs have been laid, with a ramp to the raised ground to allow disabled access into the building. Slate chips, enclosed by a recycled brick border, have been added and existing beds have been unearthed from below a large overgrown bush which was blocking the light. These have now been planted up with a variety of shrubs, perennials and herbs, including Fuchsias, Geraniums, Aubretias, Pinks, Verbena, Oxalis, Saxifrage, Campanula, Curry plants, Chives, Rosemary and Thyme for all year-round colour and contrast. Two blue planters holding evergreen Cyprus Goldcrests give it the finishing touch.

The courtyard outside the sun corridor has been revamped - the rockery replanted, a water feature installed in the pond and the gate given a new coat of paint.

The main path from the station has been re-surfaced and a new path has been created next to Shalom to allow easier access to the

lawn outside the offices. The ramp up to the large Chapel now has a new handrail to match with existing ones and there is a new metal gate across the farmer's field, next to the cottage.

We have a new contractor employed to cut the grass twice a month which really enhances the look of the lawn areas. A bit more turf has been laid to fill in the gaps in various places, which will make mowing that bit easier, but slightly longer.

There are plans to try and reintroduce some of the paths around the small pond next year, when time and funding allows. This will be a big job so needs careful planning. I will keep you updated on this. The gazebo by the pond and the well near the patio both need a little love and attention this year.

In the meantime, the cutting of brambles, dead-heading of daffodils, lawn edging and trimming will continue in earnest!

Every time I walk around the grounds I marvel at the beauty of Crowhurst and all that God has provided. A place of peace to sit and reflect. A joyful place to work.

Chapel Intercessions Book

“LORD my God, I called to you for help, and you healed me.” Psalm 30:2



Prayer is a vital part of our ministry at the Centre and many of you will know of the daily prayer list, which is compiled from people phoning the office, either for themselves or someone else. In the Chapel corridor, there are slips of paper for guests and visitors to write names for prayer and each day all the names received are typed up and later read out during the evening service or night prayer (Compline). Following this, the list of names is placed inside the Intercessions book, on top of the previous day's list. The minister then lays hands on the book, so praying to the Lord for all the names inside (where they remain for three months). This is repeated daily with new names that come in.

On the inside cover of the Prayer Book is a photograph of James Moore Hickson, the founder of the Divine Healing Mission. In 1925, James met the Revd Howard Cobb (Crowhurst's first warden) and invited him to take a mission at his church at Mill Hill, London. Before it could take place, however, Howard contracted sleeping sickness and was close to death. James laid hands on the sick man and within the day he began to recover. During his period of convalescence Howard felt called by the Lord into the healing ministry and in 1928, founded the Crowhurst Christian Healing Centre.

No one knows exactly when the prayer book and prayer list were started, or when the photo of James Hickson was added to the inside cover, but judging from the diary entry on August 21st 1931 by a departing guest called, Lucy Yates*, it was probably during Howard Cobb's tenure.

Lucy writes: *“I have seen my name in the book on the Altar, and by that book I shall be remembered at every celebration as long as I live. My name will be on the Intercession paper for some time.”*

(*Lucy Yates stayed at the CCHC from 24th to 31st August 1931 and kept a daily diary. This fascinating account of what it was like in the early years at Crowhurst is available from the Centre, priced £2.50.)

After many years of use, the book's spine was in a very sorry state (see photo below) though the bronze hard cover was still intact.

The spine was made bigger to hold more prayer lists and on the back some golden studs were added to provide more durability. (The photo at the top left of the page shows the book as it is today.)

My medical miracle!



In February this year I was admitted to hospital as an emergency after developing an increasing pain in my left calf muscle. No pulse could be found so I was given an urgent CT scan and blood tests, which indicated Peripheral Arterial Disease and showed my abdominal aorta to be completely blocked. The test results were very serious, revealing that my right leg had a slight blockage behind the knee and my left leg had a total blockage behind the knee, leading to my popliteal arteries. The Lead Consultant told me that I was a 'very, very interesting and special case' because the abdominal aorta blockage had been in place for at least ten years, but more likely nearer to twenty years. He said he was amazed! I was stunned as I hadn't had any indications before then that anything was wrong.

As we were talking, I recalled a car accident that had occurred eighteen years ago, when a newly qualified driver smashed into me at 60+ mph as I sat stationary. The accident caused muscular damage and injury to my lower legs, leaving me with painful calf muscles and hip problems that affected me when I walked. I asked the Consultant whether the accident had caused the blockages, but his view was that it had actually disguised what was an already underlying health condition. The 'amazing

thing', he said, was that over the years, my body had developed its own alternative blood-routing system! When he told me this, I immediately said it was God working in me - a miracle! He did not reject this but went on to qualify his findings saying, "*The blood had diverted itself from the abdominal aorta blockage, through smaller blood vessels (which also had to increase in size to take the blood flow) in order to re-route my main blood supply past the blockage, and then divert itself back into the main iliac arteries to both my legs.*"

Apparently I could have died at any moment and the shock as I said aloud of being a 'walking dead man' for twenty years was deeply traumatising. Yet I felt a real comfort in the knowledge that God had been working within me for all those years, busily re-routing my blood supply so that I could function. This amazed me!

I was kept in hospital to monitor whether my body might hopefully do a similar thing for the blockage problems with my legs, behind both knees. If so, it would prevent me having to have invasive surgery which apparently could be quite problematic if carried out.

The next day I was given a further ultrasound and a very faint pulse could now be found! I had REAL HOPE, though it was no surprise for me! At that moment, I had a deep sense of confirmation because, within this entire traumatic episode, I had experienced a real sense of peace, the type of peace that passes **all understanding**. A peace that my Lord was with me, sustaining me and carrying me because "*The Lord is the strength of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?*" Psalm 27:1 (NKJV)

This Psalm echoed two scriptures I was given when I first gave my life to Jesus on 7th June 1988 - Hebrews 13:5 & 6 (NIV) and Isaiah 58:11. These scriptures became instantly real and alive, adding to the confirmation that God was faithfully and continually working in me.

Book Review


I was allowed to go home two days after being admitted to hospital, the consultant feeling that my body could address the issue. In the meantime, I would have to take medication to assist in the process and provide me with some protection from further damage. Under his direction, I placed myself on a strict, life-changing diet and started walking two to three times a day, through what was severe pain.

People often ask the question, 'Where was God?' when they were going through a difficult situation. So where was God in mine? Well I believe He was with me during the accident, and through the years that followed, performing a miracle in my body!

When I was in hospital the consultant told me that the most I could expect to walk, after a long period of time, would be 400m. I now regularly walk 350m and recently managed 570m! I am so very grateful to God for His answer to the many prayers that people have made on my behalf. I now pray for God to restore my health to a level that enables me to remain active in my walk with Him and fulfil His purpose in me.

"We are pilgrims on a journey. We are brothers on the road. We are here to help each other. Walk the mile and bear the load."

Prayer and Community

Social isolation is a growing curse. As families fragment and scatter, as communities move from the real to the virtual world of the internet, as individuals get older, frailer and less able to get about, millions live solitary lives. This matters because social isolation kills: it's as bad for physical health as smoking, and destructive of mental well-being. There is a profound misery in loneliness.

This is a problem for society at large, but it is also a problem for our Church - a problem at many levels. Perhaps some parishes create strong bonds of community where everyone is included, involved, engaged - but even in those parishes, people fall by the wayside. Their health or faith falters, they stop coming to liturgies - and they effectively vanish. No-one follows up on those who disappear from the pew, and let's face it, in far too many parishes there is little real community anyway, little real inclusion; a small clique dominate, and the majority are on the fringes. This is the opposite of the loving communities Jesus calls us to.

Whose responsibility is it to build community across a Christian parish? Actually, it is everyone's job. Whoever we are, we can be pro-actively welcoming, warm and friendly to fellow parishioners. We can all make sure no-one is arriving un-greeted at a service, no-one is unknown and no-one is standing alone at coffee.

Some individuals are taking this responsibility further: for example, there is a group in Mid-Sussex who have begun holding Taize



sessions in people's homes, where six or so people gather to pray through the lovely chants of the Taize movement, and then share tea and conversation. Here is a way in which strangers can meet in the presence of the Holy Spirit and form new friendships, new contacts. Anyone could do this - and everyone from the housebound, to those slipping into dementia,

from those strong in faith to those faltering or searching, can participate.

In a similar vein, a group in Surrey promote community through art sessions, again in people's houses, and again reaching out to include the isolated and the unsure in a Christian atmosphere.

There are many ways of building community, many activities that can bring people together in the presence of God. Is there more that I can do to create the sense of inclusion and mattering, the social connection that we all need?
